Vale is the junction of six of the "Seven Routes from Portland to Idaho," and she was the recipient of some of the best local highway publicity ever received from the Oregonian in an illustrated story written by Lawrence Barber for the Sunday issue. He knows his eastern Oregon, giving the seven motor routes as follows:

John Day highway route, via Arlington, John Day, Prairie City, Vale and Nyssa, 503 miles.

The Dalles and Central Oregon, via The Dalles, Bend, Burns, Drewsey, Vale and Nyssa, 593 miles.

The Dalles and Ochocho route, via The Dalles, Redmond, Mitchell, Service creek, John Day, Vale and Nyssa, 594 miles.

McKenzie and Central Oregon highway, via Salem, Eugene, Bend, Burns, Drewsey, Vale and Nyssa, 601 miles.

McKenzie highway, Burns and John Day highway, via Eugene, Bend, Burns, John Day, Vale and Nyssa, 652 miles.

McKenzie highway and Ochocho highway, via Eugene, Redmond, Mitchell, Antone, John Day, Vale and Nyssa, 582 miles.

Old Oregon trail, via The Dalles, Arlington, Pendleton, La Grande, Baker, Ontario and Nyssa, 489 miles.

"Judging by number of inquiries the John Day highway is placed second in standpoint of importance. Motorists follow the Columbia River

highway to Arlington, then over the John Day to Fossil, John Day, Prairie, Unity and Vale to the Snake River country. It has scenic attractions which are almost unparalleled. It passes thru much timber, brown hills that rise to great heights and through beautiful farm lands. Gold mining at Prairie City attracts many tourists.

"Regardless of how you get to the Snake river valley, you will find eastern Oregon a place of greatest interest. To some it is beautiful. To others, brown rolling hills broken by green fields and sandwiched by mountains and forests of pine, have a lure that is never forgotten.

"You, too, will be sold, so to speak, after a careful examination of eastern Oregon from her seven routes to Boise."
