

Mining Activity Mormon Basin

Mormon basin mining district of northern Malheur and southern Baker counties is the scene of activity. The Rainbow mine is being electrically operated.

The Record mine at Unity, containing gold, silver and copper has been doing exploration work during the past year. Six carloads of machinery has been set up, according to W. C. Fellows, manager. He hopes to have the new plant, now in the process of construction, completed by August 1.

The mill, located about 5½ miles southwest of Unity, is being built in two sections. The building in which the rock is crushed is 36 by 48 feet and the main structure is 60 by 40 feet, making the plant one of the largest in eastern Oregon.

Fellows stated that about 6000 feet of development work has been completed and crews are now driving the lower tunnel level, which is expected to cut the vein at 1120 feet under the surface.

Flotation, concentrating and amalgamation systems will be used in the plant, the capacity of which will be 100 tons every 24 hours.

The machinery received by the Record Mining company includes a flotation plant, full diesel engine generator and other large pieces of equipment, according to a report in the Monday Baker Herald.

NEW TOWN ON ROUTE

They are the nucleus around which a city is expected to develop by reason of the construction of the Hines lumber mill. The Hines company contemplates a cutting program of 40 years continuously.

Juntura, Harper, Vale and Ontario road boosters have continuously pressed for building of the much needed cross state road, as have the many active Central Oregon fans of Harney county.

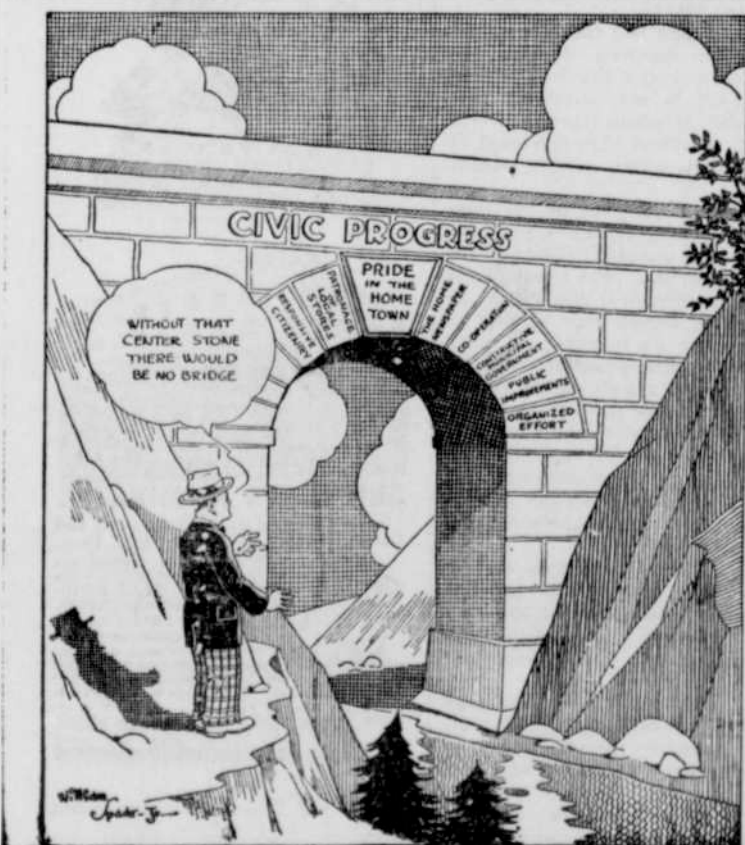
