MALHEUR LEADS WOOL PRODUCING COUNTIES BY 3 TO 1 MARGIN

Few people realize the immensity of the sheep and wool industry in Malheur county. In the 1928 report of F. L. Kent, of the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics, Malheur is listed with 265,000 sheep and lambs, topping the quota of Lake county, next high, by 137,000. Lake has 228,000, almost a third less.

Now comes R. W. Ward manager of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers, with the report that Oregon is fifth in the list of wool-producing states, with an output of 19,000,000 pounds last year. The wool industry brought an income to the state of \$51,000,000.

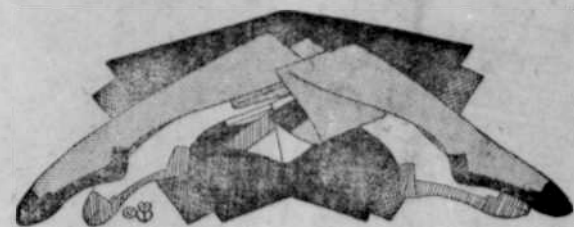

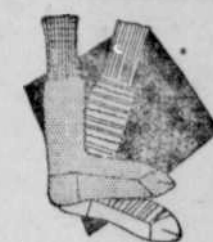
WARMSPRINGS BOARD APPROVES SETTLEMENT CONTRACT OF BONDHOLDERS

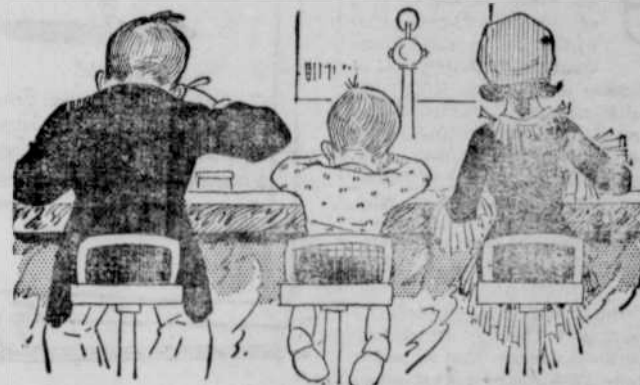
