Wheat prices took a decided jump on the Chicago market and in the Portland grain pit Monday, as result of world conditions, and it is thought the improved condition is permanent.

Potato buyers in this vicinity are talking \$1.50 to \$2 for early varieties. To date, most of the growers are holding.

Jones says the price outlook for prunes and apples is very satisfactory.

These reports bring smiles to farmers and business men of Malheur county and they make the outlook bright for this early season.

JORDAN VALLEY STOCK MEN DISCUSS PROBLEMS

William Duby, of Baker, secretary of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers association, was one of the principal speakers at the last meeting of the recently organized Jordan Valley Livestock and Ranchers Protective association. Mr. Duby reported that stockmen in that vicinity are attempting to take advantage of the district range law now in effect in Oregon. Sheep and cattlemen there are being put out of business by transient sheep. Transient sheep come in in such great numbers that local sheep are almost shut off the range.

Other leaders who attended the last Monday night meeting in Jordan Valley were C. L. Jamieson, Prineville, association vice-president; and W. L. Potter, professor of the animal husbandry department of O. S. C.

OWYHEE LOSES \$50,000 BY NEW LAW RULING

ATTORNEY-GENERAL SAYS BUY
MATERIALS ONLY WHEN AP-
PROPRIATIONS PERMIT

Washington, D. C., July 21-Interpretation of the law applicable to contracts for building material used in the Owyhee dam appears to have cost the federal government \$50,000 on cement alone.

In June the Oregon Portland Cement company, operating a mill in Baker county, submitted to the chief engineer of the bureau of reclamation a proposal to furnish 500,000 barrels of cement for the Owyhee project. By signing the contract for the delivery of this cement over a period of three and one-half years the bureau would save \$50,000 on the purchase price.

Until recently it had been the practice of the reclamation bureau to contract for such materials after congress had authorized a project and appropriated money to begin construction work, without regard to the fiscal year periods.

In making such contracts the bureau protected itself with a stipulation that, in case the necessary appropriation to carry out the purchase contract was not made, the contract or released the federal government from all liability.

The controller-general recently questioned the procedure and, before signing the contract with the Oregon Portland Cement company, the proposal was referred to the controller-general for an opinion. Senator Steiwer has been advised that the controller holds "it can't be done that way," even if the government would save \$50,000.

He holds that material purchases must be limited to the needs of the fiscal year for which appropriations are made, unless the appropriation for that year is large enough to pay for the entire quantity for which contract is signed.

With this decision from the man who controls the purse strings, the interior department has authorized a contract with the Oregon Portland Cement company for 75,000 barrels of cement.

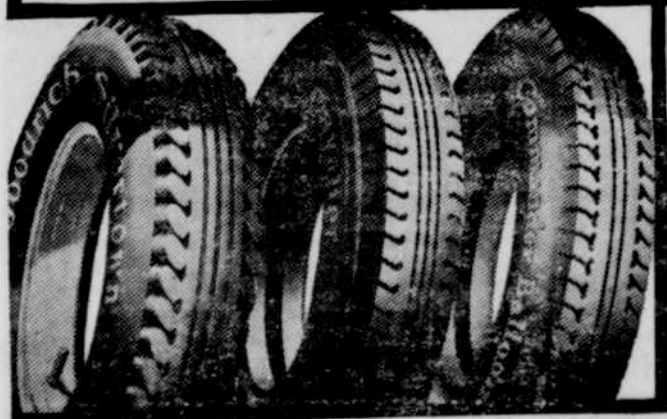
