Malheur Wheat Harvest Is On; Price Holding

Malheur county's wheat harvest is on. If the planting was average as was predicted by County Agent Larson the first of the year, golden wheat will be harvested from between 5000 and 6000 acres.

Thursday's price of \$1.07 per bushel based on the Portland exchange quotation, showed a decline of a few cents, due to a flooding of the terminals shortly after the sensational raise after it was announced that the Canada crop would be short.

Several growers of this valley have contracted at prices ranging from 95 cents to \$1.12 per bushel.

MALHEUR IS WATCHING SHORT CUT RAIL PLANS

"A hearing on the proposed cross state railroad will be held October 21, according to Commissioner McManamy and if this line will be built, Nyssa will be well satisfied," said Attorney E. M. Blodgett here Tuesday. He denied that Nyssa was opposed to the cross state line because of the fact that her people are naturally interested and favorable to the building of the proposed Nyssa to Winnemucca cut-off. "Like most of Malheur county we are much interested in both projects.

"We are for the cross state rail and we are for the proposed line of the Idaho Pacific. We have reasons to believe that due to the unwillingness of the railroad companies to build the cross state railroad, litigation may delay it for many years. We need a short cut to California markets and we need it now. If rail interests are willing and eager to build the Nyssa-Winnemucca line, have gone so far as to incorporate and to seek permission to build, we will back them up to the best of our ability.

"As to the identity of the money backers of the Idaho Pacific project, they are required to make a proper showing when permission to build is granted by the interstate commerce commission. It is hardly customary for railroad interests to make all details public. It is my opinion that support and the building of the Idaho Pacific line would hasten the cross state project, as representatives of the Union Pacific stated that if a line to serve this territory to California markets is to be built, they should build it."

Mr. Blodgett is the recently elected president of the Nyssa-Winnemucca Cut-off association.

BEULAH SHEEPMAN RETIRES, FLOCKS SOLD

He has a fine 3,000-acre ranch, 200 acres of which are in hay lands, both cultivated and wild hay, modern home with electric lights and water system and until he finds a buyer for this property he cannot completely quit and be a man of leisure. Nevertheless he contemplates a vacation. Mr. Altnow has spent practically his entire life in this part of the state actively engaged in the livestock industry. He has been successful and deserves a rest.

A preliminary survey of the proposed irrigation project which would bring the waters of Burnt River to Brogan farms will be completed soon by John E. Johnson, said Arden A. Reed, secretary of the Orchards Water company, while here Wednesday. Present findings are encouraging.

In November a year's record of water measurements of Burnt river will be available and with the two years' data obtained some time ago, a partial check-up on the amount of water available for the Brogan project can be made. The project depends largely upon this showing.

Although this has been a dry year, fruit crops at Brogan are almost up to average and growers are preparing for the busy season.
