Sarah Cochrun, daughter of David and Phebe Cockrum, was born in Madison County, Indiana, April 15, 1844, and departed this life at her home in Nyssa, Ore., Aug. 22, 1929. When six years of age she came with her parents to Iowa. She was united in marriage to John F. Lynch, Aug. 19, 1866. He had served in the Civil War as private in Co. H, 1st Reg. of Iowa Cavalry. He died Jan. 16, 1890.

Ten children were born of this union, Mary Etta, Elva Olive, Alma, Hester Frances, Wallace William, Walter Scott, Edgar Frank, Willard, John and Nora, six of whom are living and present. In addition to this are seven grand children and twenty-seven great grand children.
