

## VALE BOOSTERS ENDORSE RAIL LINES PROPOSED

LOCAL CLUB AIDS IN SENDING  
DELEGATE TO CROSS STATE  
HEARING

## SEEK CALIFORNIA OUTLET

Cross State Line and Nyssa-Winne-  
mucca Rail Endorsed—Need for  
Both Routes

(From the Malheur Enterprise)

The cross state railroad, for years promoted by Malheur county, Oregon and Idaho interests, and the proposed Nyssa-Winnemucca line initiated by the Idaho Pacific last year—were the topics of interest at a railroad booster meeting of the Vale commercial club Tuesday afternoon.

Building of the cross state line would put Vale on the main line. The route passes through the Vale project and a number of Malheur county towns. It would provide a short route to California markets. It would open up and aid in the development of a vast southeastern and central Oregon territory. The Vale club was asked to share in the expense of sending a representative to the final hearing in Washington, D. C. this month. Business men contributed the Vale quota. Robert M. Duncan of Burns was recommended as a capable delegate.

The Nyssa-Winnemucca line will provide an even shorter route to California and it was also endorsed by the Vale club. Nyssa railroad boosters, E. M. Blodgett, Frank T. Morgan and Dr. J. J. Sarazin, here Wednesday, have secured the cooperation of many Idaho and eastern Oregon towns. The application of the Idaho Pacific to build has been widely approved, they advise. A hearing will be held in San Francisco this month.

## TURKEY GROWERS MAKE FALL MARKETING PLANS

ASSOCIATION ARRANGING TO  
HANDLE ITS OWN BIRDS—CASH  
ON DELIVERY ASSURED

"If present plans mature, the Idaho-Oregon turkey growers' association will operate its own packing crews and these will receive, grade, weigh and pack the birds as they are brought in by the growers," Mrs. C. G. Brink, manager, announces. "This will eliminate any dissatisfaction on the part of the growers who may have suffered by having their birds graded and packed by buyers heretofore. The buyers will be on hand to check the work of the association crews before receiving the shipments."

"This year the full cash price will be paid on delivery of the birds," said Mrs. Brink, indicating that buyers are prepared to deposit a half million dollars to pay off the association members.

"Due to the heavy Texas crop this year there will be a smaller demand for No. 2 birds. No. 1 birds will be preferred in the association pool, which includes turkey growers of Idaho and Oregon. No trouble is anticipated for the growers in delivering large quotas of No. 1 birds because there has been a great improvement in the stock and fewer birds of below grade have been raised this year. We plan to market a quarter million turkeys, mostly top grade No. 1."

"Late this year between December and January, it is planned to operate a turkey special, through Idaho and Oregon, to show the outlying districts the results to be attained by a careful selection of stock and proper care of birds. Assistance of the Oregon state college and University of Idaho has been assured."

## Brogan Farmer Talks Portland Freight Rates

Arden Reed, Brogan, has something to say to Portland.

He would like to ship the peaches that he grows to Portland. But he can ship a bushel of fruit to Kansas City, Missouri, at lower cost than to Portland, Oregon. x x x

Arden Reed and family came to Brogan in 1921. He rented, and three years later bought, an irrigated farm. That is, it was supposed to be irrigated. But there had been serious over-estimates.

A great deal more land was laid out for the little stream to irrigate than it had water for. In a dry season like this the stream is a bone-dry channel. The newcomer began a battle for preservation. He and his neighbors enforced through the courts the contracts for water given them by the big land company, and the result was that lower down hundreds of acres of beautiful orchard died. But they had such water as there was.

He planted peach trees three years ago. The trees have grown as much as in six years west of the range. They bear hundreds of bushels of luscious fruit.

But peril came. Everywhere the drouth has persisted. Around Portland it fills the air with the smoke of tragic forest fires. In Eastern Oregon it creates the gloom of tragic disappointment. But Arden Reed could not bear to see his fine young trees turn brown and the reddening fruit wither. Hurriedly he sank a well more than 500 feet deep. He found the water—75 gallons a minute. He hitched his tractor to the pump and little streams ran down the lines of trees.

This man says that since 1921 there has been but one year, even through the agricultural depression, that he has gone behind. He has made good in what State Engineer Luper says was the most financially disastrous private irrigation project in Oregon, the privately owned Brogan project. You can see why.

Eastern Oregon, like Southern Idaho, lacks export rates that would make Portland its port. Thus it loses opportunity for transpacific and Panama canal shipments of products that the markets demand. And Portland loses the chance for trade of her own trade territory.—Oregon Journal.

CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY COMMISSIONERS INSPECT LAST 25-MILE CALIFORNIA LINK

## PARK CUT-OFF PROGRESSES

V. M. Tanner Encouraged by Favorable Sentiment Expressed at Association Meet at Alturas Friday

The California state highway commission has inspected the section of the proposed Yellowstone Cut-Off highway between Alturas and the Oregon state line, with a view to having it placed on the California highway system and having construction of the 25-mile link approved. This stretch is the last gap of the Yellowstone Cut-Off in California as this year saw the reconstruction of the 49-mile link between Alturas and Redding.

V. M. Tanner, secretary of the association, who was over the route with the California commissioners and others following an association meeting in Alturas last Friday, advised Vale Cut-Off boosters Wednesday that he considers the recent inspection another step forward in the promotion of the California-Oregon-Idaho short cut highway.

Three things stand out prominently in the past summer's progress, Mr. Tanner declared. First in importance is actual construction in Oregon and California, and the promise of additional work. Second—despite the fact that the road has not been generally improved, it has been used by many tourists. Third, the people of southern California are interested in business and farming opportunities in Oregon and Idaho.

## \$8000 SPENT FIGHTING FIRES IN THE WHITMAN FOREST THIS SEASON

The cost of fighting fire on the Whitman National forest to date this year amounts to approximately \$8000 it was reported at Baker headquarters.

There have been 99 fires on the Whitman forest this year, 71 of them being less than a quarter of an acre, 24 from one-quarter to 10 acres and four over 10 acres. The total area burned over amounted to 591 acres. Of the 99 fires, 74 were caused by

lightning, 20 by smokers, three by campers, one by lumbermen and one was miscellaneous.

During the past 10 days there have been six lightning fires and one started during logging operations. All of the blazes were small.

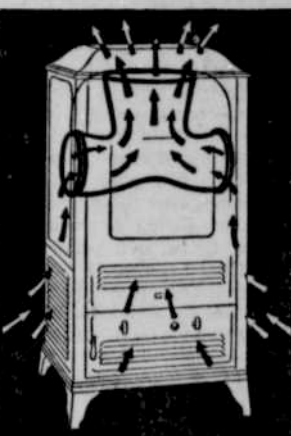
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
