

TURKEY GROWERS WILL SELL FIRST POOL NOVEMBER 2

MRS. BRINK ANNOUNCES GRADING WILL BE ON NO. 1 AND NO. 2 BIRDS

ASSOCIATION WILL RECEIVE

Present Plan of Turkey Growers' Association is to Receive and Pack Its Own Produce

For information of Malheur county and eastern Oregon turkey growers, most of whom are members of the Malheur-Oregon cooperative marketing association, Mrs. C. G. Brink, secretary-manager, announces that the first pool of turkeys will be sold at the Boise chamber of commerce at 2 o'clock November 2. Grading will be the same as last year on No. 1 and No. 2 birds. Growers will be notified of time of delivery later.

Present plans mature, the association will operate its own packing house and these will receive, grade, weigh and pack the birds as they are brought in by the growers. Mrs. Brink stated, "This will tend to eliminate any dissatisfaction on the part of the growers who may have suffered by having their birds graded and packed by buyers here. The buyers will be on hand to check the work of the association before receiving the shipments. This year the full cash price will be paid on delivery of the birds," said Mrs. Brink, indicating that buyers are prepared to deposit a half dollar to pay off the association members.

Due to the heavy Texas crop this year there will be a smaller demand for No. 2 birds. No. 1 birds will be sold in the association pool, which includes turkey growers of Malheur and Oregon. No trouble is anticipated for the growers in delivering large quotas of No. 1 birds. There has been a great improvement in the stock and fewer birds of below grade have been raised.
