Let Surfacing Of Vale-Harper Highway Link

Bids on the surfacing of 22 miles and widening 6.5 miles of the Central Oregon highway between Vale and Harper were received by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland Wednesday. The low bidder was Willamette Contract company, \$114,431. Owing to the fact that this company, which is working on a contract on the Pilot Rock-John Day highway, has made slow progress, the contract was let to Joslin & McAllister for \$114,581.

A contract for grading the Horse Ridge section, 8.4 miles, was awarded to H. C. Boyer, on his bid of \$57,729.

Because of controversies over location between Burns and Juntura, the commission will make a personal inspection of the rival Crane and Drewsey routes probably during the first week in September.

Construction of the Central Oregon is being expedited by the commission, much to the gratification of south-eastern Oregon.

VALE-OWYHEE ROADS RAISE COUNTY TAXES

TENTATIVE BUDGET FOR MALHEUR COUNTY FOR 1930 CALLS FOR \$312,015.05

While the tentative budget of expenses for Malheur county in 1930, published in detail in this and next week's issue, must be pared down to comply with the six per cent limitation law before levies are made, the budget committee increased several items to care for the growing demands that result from the greatest development program Malheur county has ever known. More money for roads to serve the Vale and Owyhee projects principally, largely accounts for the increase of \$23,457.57 over last year in the amount to be raised by taxation, the estimate calling for \$312,015.05. The road item was increased from \$60,000 to \$80,000.

Items for care of poor and advertising county lands were added to, the latter item to permit cooperation in land settlement work.

The county budget committee meeting in Vale last week, consisted of Judge H. Lee Noe, chairman; Frank T. Morgan, secretary; J. D. Fairman, E. M. Blodgett, H. C. Boyer, Leo H. Schmidt.

Wednesday afternoon, December 4, at Vale has been set as the time for the taxpayers' meeting.

Rome Wools Won 1st For Malheur

A splendid fine wool fleece exhibited by Mrs. Agnes M. Tudor of Rome, Malheur county, won first prize for fine staple fleeces in the commercial division of the wool show that was held by the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers in connection with the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland last week.

W. J. Weese of Ontraio is another Malheur county winner. His Half Blood Combing fleece won second. The Oregon Wool Growers silver trophy for the best Oregon fleece in the show from the manufacturer's standpoint was won by John E. Chamberlain, Mt. Vernon, Grant county. The Oregon City Woolen Mills trophy for championship Half Blood fleece went to C. W. Lewis of Klamath Falls. Other Eastern Oregon winners were C. H. Wasson of Baker who won second for Quarter Blood Combing wool and R. R. Roberts of Powell Butte who won fourth for Fine Staple wool.

Mrs. Tudor's entry was a runner-up for championship honors in the Fine Staple class, the championship trophy being won by an Ohio fleece from registered sheep.

FOLLOW THE COW PATH

People about the country, especially city planners, have poked a great deal of fun at Boston whose streets so it was claimed, were the original cow trails our Puritan forefathers followed from their log houses down to the edge of the Bay where John Hancock, and others who signed the Declaration, had their shops.

Of all the animals man has domesticated and put into his service the cow leads them all in usefulness and productivity. Last year the cows of Wisconsin produced in new wealth the staggering total of \$290,000,000. The state has two million of these greatest friends of man. In Oregon last year our 216,000 dairy animals produced \$28,397,000 in new wealth—the greatest single agricultural income in the state, greater than the wheat crop, larger than all the fruit, larger by far than the vegetable yield.

Oregon is destined to become one of the outstanding dairy districts of the west, mainly because we have so many areas like the original home of the cow. Our neighbor, California, needs an increasing amount of butter from other states—about 44,000,000 pounds in 1928. California buyers have been invading the southern Oregon country for butter and have been shipping our dairy animals as fast as we can raise them. Markets everywhere will absorb quality products.

Let us also remember that dairying becomes a great payroll whose pay checks come in a never-ending weekly and monthly stream. There are few shutdowns in this industry. There are few hazards that some other product will enter the market to take its place. There is little danger that the raw material will not be depleted, destroyed or exhausted and the industry move away. It is not an occupation that undermines the health of the workers.

Dairying has a history of successful and expanding achievement covering a thousand years which every one knows. It has no cycles of failures. It has never been classed as "risky" or "hazardous" or "Fly-by-night." Bank and business failures were practically unknown in the dairy sections during the post-war deflation period. It is a great stabilizing influence wherever followed. Contentment and prosperity accompany its extension. That is the record of those who "follow the cow path."
