# VALE-BWYHEE MOURN

RECLAMATION DIRECTOR WAS FRIEND OF LOCAL PROJECTS. FATHERED SETTLEMENT PLAN

The Vale and Owyhee irrigation rojects lost a friend in the death of George C. Kreutzer, 45, director of reclamation economics of the interior department. He died very suddenly in Washington D. C., Saturday, being stricken while talking to an assistant in his office.

Kreutzer, a native of Shedalia, Colo., was an official of the reclamation bureau for four years. Before that time he had been associated with Commissioner Mead and did reclamation and irrigation engineering work both in this country and

He was keenly interested in the Vale irrigation project, the first to be built and colonized under new reclamation rulings. He fathered the plan of a local colonization association and was personally and officially interested in the Harper unit settlement which might be called "Kreutzer's plan."

He was here several times and was respected as a sincere and efficient agent of the reclamation de partment. His death is mourned b nany friends in Malheur county.
