MR. HOOVER'S ADDRESS

Millions of individuals here and abroad were encouraged when they read the Armistice Day speech of the President of the United States. They draw comfort from the fact that the head of the strongest nation in the world is striving with might and main to find a way to prevent wars. Americans applaud his sentiments as expressing the true spirit of America, while foreigners can not but feel that the United States may be depended upon to take a leading part in effective steps to maintain peace.

Mr. Hoover does not indulge in the day-dream of a blissful peace accomplished by mere example. He does not advocate the scrapping of ships and arms by this country as a means of inducing other countries to follow suit. Indeed, he recognizes the massive fact, always ignored or distorted by pacifists, that lack of defense is provocative of war. The world is under arms; with 10,000,000 more active and reserve soldiers than before the late war. Combatant ships have been decreased somewhat, but aircraft and other war weapons are more potent than before the war. The President reminds the country that experience gives warning that wars are to be expected. At the same time, the world is more genuinely inclined toward peace than ever before. The almost universal adherence to the Kellogg pact is a most significant proof of this progress.

GOODS NOT ORDERED

Considerable annoyance is often caused by the practice of certain firms which send goods by mail to persons who have not ordered them. Sometimes the goods are accompanied by stamps for their return in case the recipient does not desire to keep and pay for them. But the rewrapping and return of these packages is unnecessary, according to the National Better Business Bureau, which has obtained legal opinions on the subject.

"So long as unordered goods are not used by the recipient, he need neither return nor pay for them," says the Bureau. All that can be expected is that the recipient hold the goods ready to be returned in case a representative of the sender calls for them. And if they are not called for within a reasonable time, the recipient may have a claim for storage.

While no one would ordinarily desire to keep goods for which payment had not been made, the paying for unordered merchandise, or even its return to the sender, simply encourages the practice of trying to force the goods upon the public. If everyone would follow the advice here given, the nuisance would be stopped in short order.

GAS DANGER IN GARAGE

We read frequently in press dispatches of someone meeting death from carbon monoxide gas from the exhaust of his automobile, usually in a closed garage.

Warnings concern this danger have been issued by the Public Health Service. Especially in the colder sections of the country are these accidents likely to happen, where drivers sometimes let the engine run for a time to warm up, before driving out of the garage.

The smallest engine will give off enough carbon monoxide gas in two or three minutes to make the air of an ordinary garage dangerous, while larger engines will naturally contaminate the air in less time.

This gas is almost odorless and by a peculiar effect on the red corpuscles of the blood it causes death by paralysis of the respiratory organs. While the victim loses consciousness gradually, he may be paralyzed to such an extent that he is unable to escape, by the time he becomes aware of his danger.

The only safe plan is to avoid running an automobile engine at all in any place not well ventilated.
