COUNTY AGENT AND ASSISTANT ARE LINING UP FOUR-DAY PROGRAM

O. S. C. EXPERTS COMING

Dairying, Farm Crops, Horticulture and Home Economics to be Topics Discussed by Extension Leaders

Farmers and ranchers of all Malheur county are invited to the annual Farmer's Week convention at the courthouse in Vale January 28, 29, 30 and 31. Every effort to make the institute a big success, of actual value to the farmer, is being made by R. G. Larson, county agent, and his assistant, W. Wray Lawrence. It is to be a big meeting. Specialists from Oregon state college will be main speakers.

Tuesday, January 28, will be dairy day. N. C. Jamieson, dairy special-

ist, will lead subject matter discussions.

Wednesday, January 29, is farm crops day. E. R. Jackman, crops expert of the college, is in charge.

Thursday, January 30, is horticultural day and the speaker is C. L. Long, another specialist from the college who is well and favorably known by the farmers "who keep pace."

A home economics day is being planned but definite arrangements have not yet been completed.

Mr. Larson is arranging for a closing banquet with the Vale commercial club at the Drexel Hotel.

These institutes are a valuable part of the county agent's program and there is much to be gained by attendance. YOUTH ESCAPED FROM COUNTY JAIL; FACED PEN TERM

RUSSELL BOSTON WAS SENTENCED TO SERVE TWO YEARS FOR FORGERY CHARGE

DEPUTY SHERIFF ATTACKED

Chas. Leavitt Struck, Rendered Unconscious, as Prisoner Made His Escape into Freezing Night

After striking Deputy Sheriff Chas. F. Leavitt severe blows on the head which rendered him unconscious, Russell Boston, 20, escaped from the Malheur county jail at Vale Thursday night. Even the elements made his liberty costly as it was 22 degrees below zero, the coldest weather of many years in the Vale section.

On account of illness, Russell had been transferred to the woman's ward near the front of the jail. He had bound a stick and clothes hanger together and with this had secured the keys outside his door. He appropriated a small amount of money belonging to prisoners that was found in a drawer. He crouched in the dark corridor and when the deputy sheriff came to make the night rounds about 8:30, Russell struck him just as he attempted to turn on the light.

Leavitt was painfully injured about the head but it is reported his injuries are not serious.

Despite the "northerner," that kept the temperature far below zero Thursday night and Friday, Sheriff C. W. Glenn and deputies have been on the hunt for Boston since his escape became known.

Boston pleaded guilty Monday to a charge of forgery of two checks on his uncle, John Boston, in Vale last July. After indictment last summer, he could not be found and recently was returned from California.

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MALHEUR DIVIDED INTO 12 CENSUS DISTRICTS

B. S. CRABILL HAS ARRANGED FOR TWELVE ENUMERATORS IN THIS DIVISION

Compared to the 241 questions on the 1930 census blanks, which the farmers must answer for the information of Uncle Sam this spring, the town resident gets off easy with 29 questions. B. S. Crabill, here Friday from Baker, explained the new blanks and the division in Malheur county. The farm questions cover everything from crop production to amount of gasoline purchased.

Mr. Crabill has divided Malheur into 12 census districts, each district to require one enumerator. In this way, the work will be a short but worth while job for each enumerator. The census taking will require several weeks and will pay in the neighborhood of \$100. Mr. Crabill said. To save time local applicants should write the Bureau of Census, Washington, D. C., for application blanks.

Mr. Crabill has charge of the census report in Malheur, Baker, Harney and Grant counties. On his trip last week and this he was arranging divisions in Malheur and Harney counties. Enumerators begin work April 2.
