

HENRY L. CORBETT IN RACE FOR GOVERNOR

RESIGNED SENATOR OF MULTNOMAH COUNTY SEEKING GUBERNATORIAL OFFICE

Portland—(Special to the Malheur Enterprise)—Henry L. Corbett, who has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor in the coming primaries, was born in Portland 48 years ago, July 29, 1881. He was educated at the old Portland Academy and Harvard University. In 1908 he married Miss Gretchen Hoyt and they have five children—three boys and two girls.

Mr. Corbett's interest in politics comes quite naturally. His grandfather, Henry W. Corbett, one of the early residents of Portland, represented Oregon in the United States Senate from 1867 to 1873, and throughout the years of his active life in this state was a leader in both civic and political affairs.

It was in 1923 that Mr. Corbett first became a candidate for political office. By a big vote he was elected senator from Multnomah county. He was re-elected in 1924 and 1928 and held the office until he resigned two weeks ago to enable citizens of Multnomah county to

have a full representation in the senate in case he is successful in his campaign for the governorship. He was president of the senate in 1927, and twice was acting governor during the absence from the state of Governor Patterson.

For years Mr. Corbett has managed the Corbett Investment Co., which includes real property, live stock, agriculture and banking. He is past president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. During the war he was chairman of the National Council of Defense, chairman of two state-wide Red Cross drives, and was in training preparing to follow his two brothers into service when the armistice was signed.

For years he has had a deep interest in the Pacific International Livestock Exposition and was recently elected president of the organization which annually produces its great show in Portland. Members of the Corbett family for many years have been affiliated with the First Presbyterian church of Portland.

Harper—Charles McCurdy, employee of the Derbon company on the Harper unit of the Vale project, was removed from the Ontario hospital to Boise for further treatment as an infection in his leg developed. McCurdy suffered a broken and crushed limb when he was caught between two dinky engines on the Derbon works early last week. McCurdy is a former Nyssa resident.

13,000,000 ACRES IN STATE

Reclamation and Livestock Problems
of Malheur County Affected by
Public Land Proposal

A committee of five members was appointed by Governor Norblad Saturday to make an exhaustive study relative to the unreserved public lands in Oregon for the Hoover public land board. Members of the Oregon committee are R. N. Stanfield, R. G. Callvert, Wm. Duby, W. B. Snyder and Olin Arnsperger. A report is to be made in three weeks for presentation by E. C. Van Petten to the Hoover board which will convene in Washington the latter part of February.

Governor Norblad said he considered the appointment of Mr. Callvert because he represented the late Governor Patterson at the Salt Lake meeting of governors which first considered the proposal that all unclassified public lands should be returned to the states. Mr. Callvert is editor of the Oregonian.

Mr. Duby is a foremost sheep raiser of Baker. He is familiar with problems of the stock man.

Mr. Stanfield, while a member of the United States senate, served as chairman of the public lands committee. His knowledge of the subject will prove helpful, said Governor Norblad, and Mr. Stanfield is also familiar with the subject from a sheepman's standpoint. He has large interests in Malheur and Baker counties.

Mr. Snyder is a cattle raiser of Paisley.

Mr. Arnsperger of Medford is past president of the Oregon irrigation congress. The committee will have the assistance of Rhea Luper, state engineer, state forestry and land office officials.

Questions raised Saturday indicated considerable opposition to the plan. Among these questions were these: Who will pay for restoration of public lands which have depreciated through neglect and lack of regulation by the federal government? Should the return of such lands to the state be considered as adequate compensation for natural resources such as timber which have been removed from states by the federal government for the benefit of the entire nation? What effect would the proposed gift have on reclamation lands and their future development?

It was pointed out that more than 13,000,000 acres representing a quarter of the area of the state, was involved in Oregon. All but one million acres of this land is in the southeastern part of the state.

Malheur county is interested as she largely shares in the Oregon public land area and reclamation.

DAIRY SLUMP MAY LEAVE BENEFITS

BAD PRESENT MARKET EXPECTED TO RID COUNTY OF SCRUBS; ADVERTISING NEEDED

Though the immediate situation is anything but bright for the dairyman, present conditions may lead to a readjustment of the entire industry beneficial to dairymen in business on a major scale rather than as a sideline, believes P. M. Brandt, chief in dairying at Oregon State college, who has made an analysis of the present market crisis.

"The decline in the dairy market, though greater than expected, was forecast in the federal and state outlook report of a year ago in which it was pointed out that but a slight increase in production or drop in consumption would raise the domestic supply above the demand," said Professor Brandt.

"It is apparent that the present status of the industry can only be changed by adjusting supply and demand. Whether this will be brought about by increased consumption or curtailed production or both, will probably be determined largely by general economic conditions."

Professor Brandt believes that present market conditions afford the best opportunity for eliminating low producing or diseased cows from herds and for increasing the use of dairy products on farms, as well as for making a unified educational campaign on the danger in substituting vegetable oils for dairy products. "The present condition may result in the elimination of many small herds as well as individual unprofit-

able cows and thus stimulate the industry by centering most of the production in the larger herds operated on a purely business basis," explained Professor Brandt.

"Dairy products have not been advertised in Oregon as have vegetable substitutes. Last year there was an increased consumption of substitutes almost equal to the butter surplus at the end of the year. The dairy industry must actively stimulate consumption by education and advertising. In this farmers may well set the example by using only dairy products in their own homes."
