HARPER CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IS SELECTED AS NAME AT ANNUAL MEETING

WATER CELEBRATION IN MARCH

J. D. Fairman Appointed Chairman of Entertainment Committee by C. J. Bush, New Club President

At a rousing annual meeting of the Harper Chamber of Commerce, it was decided to change the name from commercial club to Harper Chamber after the fashion of the Oregon state chamber legislation. The important topic was a celebration of the turning of water into the canals of the Vale irrigation project and dedication of the diversion dam in the Malheur river above Harper. The Harper club will put on this celebration in royal style. J. D. Fairman was appointed chairman of the entertainment committee. Governor Norblad and other prominent officials of the state are expected to attend.

The Harper chamber elected the following officers for 1930: Chas. J. Bush, president; George I. Fenton, vice-president; C. M. MacCamy, treasurer; Wm. G. Morgan, secretary; and a membership committee consisting of E. M. Carter, John N. Turner, L. F. Hucker and K. R. Bach.

Payment to the state chamber for 25 members was ordered and it is hoped that the number will be increased to over 100 by active cooperation of the settlers in the valley and surrounding territory. It is noted that the newcomers are all progressive and the North Side Water Users' association is planning a permanent improvement of the main canal which furnishes water for the original settlers which are not under the government canal. Keep your eye on Harper for progress where with the slogan in force, "All for Harper—Room for All," will mean something bigger for 1930.

Leonard Simpson sends an interesting story of his trip from Oakland to Los Angeles in airplane, follows: "An all night trip took me from Winnemucca to Oakland. From there to Los Angeles by Western Air Express required from 9 a. m. until noon. At an elevation of about 8000 feet we flew straight south. It was a sunny day and we could see the hills back of Oakland, the snowy Sierras to the east and the beautiful Pacific to the west. San Joaquin valley was covered with fog. Over the mountains along Ridge Route we went up another 1200 feet and there the wind was blowing fiercely. The ship did some fancy drops and dips with thrills a plenty. Eleven were on board. We covered the 365 miles to L. A. at the rate of two miles a minute."
