It did our hearts good to see a very fine article about the Vale irrigation project dedication and the Vale and Owyhee construction in an issue of the Oregon Statesman, Salem, in which the first paragraph stated:

"The turning of water into the ditches of the first unit of 4000 acres of land marks the partial fruition of the hopes of the residents of southeastern Oregon for more than a generation. When the whole Vale project is finished and the Owyhee project as well, that section of the country promises to become one of the most productive areas of the northwest. Residents in western Oregon do not appreciate or understand the scope of this development in irrigation, and for this reason The Statesman published a description of the Vale and Owyhee, the greatest irrigation development now in progress in the United States."

Then followed descriptive matter in detail, over two columns of it and a splendid feature was a map of Oregon, which showed in black—irrigation development in Malheur county. It was complete to the Warm Springs, Jordan Valley and all other smaller private irrigation districts.

E. G. Harlan, of the state chamber, has already written a letter of appreciation to the Salem paper on behalf of the local commercial clubs. We sincerely add a word of thanks for this helpful publicity and at the same time express our appreciation to numerous other papers of the state, particularly those of Portland, who have long championed eastern Oregon irrigation.

to Sagebrush Land
Is Malheur Theme

"What Water Does to Sagebrush Land," is the theme of a picture representative of Malheur county, carried in the new booklet "Oregon" just issued by the Oregon state chamber of commerce. These pertinent facts accompany the picture:

Area 6,325,120 acres.

Property valuation \$11,966,144.

Number of farms 1331.

Rainfall 10 inches annually.

Climate, short winters, light snowfall, long irrigation season, 280 days sunshine.

Lands and soils, volcanic ash, rich alluvial deposits, sandy loam, large hill and mountain range areas. Irrigated pastures.

Main crops, alfalfa, clover, wool, grain, corn, potatoes, apples, onions, honey, fruit and dairy products.

Schools, grade and high.

Transportation, Union Pacific, stage and truck.

Recreation, hunting, fishing.

Price of land per acre, range, \$2 to \$10 per acre, unimproved in reclamation projects \$5 to \$15, improved, \$75 to \$200.

The booklet carries similar information on every county in Oregon. The cover is a strikingly colorful farm scene in red, green, blue, yellow and purple, very "modernistic." It represents one item of the \$25,000 appropriated by the legislature for state advertising.
