## TEST SUIT IS BARRIER NOW

Malheur County Concerned in Outcome as Proposed Road Would Give Long Desired Outlet

Salem—(Special to the Malheur Enterprise)—The Oregon public service commission will intervene on behalf of the state in the suit brought by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company to enjoin the interstate commerce commission from enforcing its order relative to the construction of the cross state railroad from Crane to Crescent.

"The commission was responsible for obtaining the order for construction," said F. Miller, chairman, "and it goes without saying that this commission will intervene on behalf of Oregon citizens."

The order of the interstate commission provided that the extension of 182 miles should be constructed by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, and that work should begin by July 1, 1930. Further provision was made in the order that the road should be completed and ready for operation by July 1, 1933.

The railroad company is attacking the constitutionality of the interpretation of the federal law under which the order was made.

All other lines and extensions included in the Oregon public service commission's original railroad development program have been completed.

The extension is desired by all of Oregon, even the western part of state joining the eastern and central sections in their plea. It would furnish an outlook to California markets for this agricultural empire that will double its production when the Vale and Owyhee irrigation projects are completed.

## EXCELLENT SCHOLARSHIP

In a letter to the Malheur Enterprise received this week from Malheur county's best eighth grade student of the year, Betty Ackerman, of Ontario, came the interesting report that on three papers Betty was graded 100, on three 99, on three 98 and one 95. FORTY-TWO STUDENTS MADE  
COVETED HONOR ROLL IN  
STATE EXAMINATIONS

Three Town and Twelve Rural  
School Districts Share in 1930  
Honors for Above 90 Grades

Forty-two eighth graders, representing fifteen school districts of Malheur county, made honor grades, an average above 90, in the recent state and county examinations, announced Mrs. E. M. Crail, county school superintendent Friday. Rural schools again kept pace with students of the town systems.

To Betty Ackerman of Ontario goes the highest average in the county, 98.8 per cent. This is the highest average recorded in eighth grade examinations since 1921 when Margaret Humphrey scored 97.7 per cent and Katherine Boswell 97.2. Both were Vale students.

With 94 per cent, Edna Johnson is high for Vale. Alma Hurt and Barbara Ketchum tied for second with 90 each.

Harry Cockrum was second in the county with 96.7, Lorraine Laxon 96.4, Ellen Palmer 96.1, Frances McClain 95.8, Bob Chapel 94, Sybil Hickey 92, Evalene Pitzer 92, Jean Graden 92, Mary Messenger 91, Edna Reed 90, Esther Parker 90, Nora Doty 90. With a total of 13 honor students for Ontario, their school made an excellent record.
