HARPER DOUBLES ITS POPULATION IN DECADE

Harper more than doubled its population in the last decade. Population for 1920 was 206; for 1930, 481; increase 275, reports a return from B. S. Crabill, census supervisor for this district. Sixty-six farms were enumerated in the Harper precinct. This splendid growth is due largely to development of the Harper and Little Valley units of the Vale irrigation project.

Fair shows a substantial growth with 444 people in 1930 as compared with 376 in 1920. There are 94 farms in Fair precinct.

With 98 farms, Applegate's population is 422. This is another of the larger farming communities of the county.

Malheur decreased from 267 in 1920 to 204, including 34 farms.

Watson decreased from 182 to 127, farms 27.

Arcadia decreased from 722 to 558, farms 101.

Jamieson lost almost half its population, the present enumeration 122 as compared with 240 in 1920. It is expected that Jamieson will show as

marked growth as Harper has when the Jamieson unit of the Vale project is completed.

Snake river dropped from 680 to 403, farms 85.
