Home Pointers

A rubber plate scraper scrapes
the dish better than a knife or
fork and saves fatigue because it
is noiseless.

Where kitchen debris is to be
burned, unnecessary work will be
saved by scraping it directly onto
a paper instead of some contain-
er which must be washed later.
Fruit is cheaper and of better
quality when in season.

Some kind of cereal grows in
every part of the world except
the Arctic.

Canned foods keep best in a
cool, dry closet or storeroom.
Possible fading of those in glass
jars is prevented by shielding
from the light.

Bacon, fried crisp, broken into
small pieces and served on top of
chopped, cooked greens, gives a
delicious flavor. A little of the
bacon fat may also be mixed in
to give added richness.

Green peas are the one excep-
tion of the rule that green vege-
tables should be boiled quickly
and briefly in salted water. Peas
keep their green color better and
are less likely to pop open their
skins and become mushy if they
are simmered, and not allowed to
boil. They also cook tender more
quickly that way.

Hollandaise sauce, made with
egg yolks, butter and lemon juice
is a delicious accompaniment for
asparagus.

Farm Pointers

Leafiness in alfalfa is an im-
portant indication of quality, as
from 50 to 60 per cent of the
plant weight and 70 to 75 per
cent of the protein, one of the
most necessary feed constituents,
is contained in the leaves, say
crop specialists at Oregon State
college. Feeders of alfalfa
everywhere recognize the value
of good leafy alfalfa.

Feeding of clover or other hay
that has been affected with
powdery mildew has shown no ill
effects on stock at the Oregon
Experiment station, and the
fungus appears to be in no way
poisonous. Yields on acreages
affected with this disease are be-
low normal, however, and the
seed pods do not fill out. Dust-
ing with sulfur while the growth
is short is recommended for its
control.

Wherever the practise of ade-
quate regulation and inspection
of market milk has been firmly
established on a practical basis, it
has seldom been given up. It
stabilizes the industry, improves
the quality of the milk and in-
creases consumption. The dairy-
man becomes an up-to-date, sani-
tary, efficient operator, while the
consumer is satisfied and grateful
for the protection afforded.

Practically all pastures that
have been utilized for some time
can be improved by fertilization
with phosphates and lime, tests
at the Oregon Experiment sta-
tion show.

Anything that can be done to
improve the quality of the hay
crop is fully as important as in-
creasing quantity, say agronom-
ists at the Oregon Experiment
station. The ultimate result is
more profit to the producer.

Enemy of Plant Lice

Of the wasps there are some who
pack away moths, some who use flies,
some who capture leaf hoppers and
some who hunt aphids, says Nature
Magazine. The aphid hunters are the
most numerous. They are the Pem-
phredon wasps, assiduous collectors of
plant lice.

Old College Regulation

Educational regulations have changed
in Texas since the catalogue for 1874-
75 of Add-Ran college at Fort Worth
contained this rule: "It is required
of all students that they neither keep
in their possession or use any fire-
arms, a dirk, a bowie knife, nor any
kind of deadly weapon."
