Farm Pointers

Legumes, green manure cover crops, and barnyard manure have aided in obtaining deeper penetration of irrigation water on heavy soils in the Rogue River valley and have increased the size and yield of fruit.

The practise of "worming" laying flocks at regular intervals is considered poor policy by the Oregon Experiment station. The best control for cecum worms or any other similar parasites, is through sanitation and the use of medicines is merely an emergency measure.

Trials at the Oregon Experiment station have shown that applications of phosphate fertilizers in combination with manure on "worn-out" grain land in the Willamette valley will give profitable increases with grain and corn, and that this is also a profitable treatment for potatoes on the red-hill soils.

Cement floors for poultry houses will remain free from dampness even in wet weather if they are insulated from the ground by being constructed on a layer of coarse gravel, says the Oregon Experiment station.

The practice of putting screens under perches in poultry houses is gaining in favor, says the Oregon Experiment station. This tends to prevent disease and results in the saving of quite a number of eggs that otherwise would be broken by dropping to the floor.

FIRE CHIEFS PLAN COLLEGE

There is science in fire fighting says the experts, so Oregon fire chiefs and some of their men are planning to get the latest methods of fire prevention and control at a special firemen's school scheduled at Oregon State college August 18-22 under the joint auspices of the Oregon Fire Chief's association, the state fire marshal's office and the school of engineering. The annual convention of the fire chiefs will be held at the same time.

POULTRYMEN WANT MORE PUBLICITY

More advertising of poultry and eggs to increase consumption is favored by Oregon poultrymen who held their eighth annual convention at Oregon State college late in July. The egg producers heard from Charles D. Byrne, head of the industrial journalism department what is being done by the dairymen and passed a resolution to have a committee arrange similar plans for them—including a statewide poultry demonstration train if possible.

The convention this year was the largest attended in the association history, more than 350 men and women being present to hear an extensive educational program, inspect the new demonstration poultry plant at the college and transact annual business. As the association is not in need of funds, membership was placed on a two-year basis at no raise in dues.

Conditions in the industry in this state were reported fairly satisfactory in spite of lowered prices, though many references were made to the need of keeping

strictly abreast of new developments. Action taken favored continued appropriations for disease control work in both chickens and turkeys.

FARM BOARD LEADERS TO MEET WHEAT MEN

Arthur Hyde, secretary of agriculture and Alexander Legge, chairman of the farm board, are going to bring their ideas on the present world wheat situation directly to the farmers of the Pacific northwest at meetings in Spokane and Pendleton August 8-9, according to arrangements just completed with the extension service of Oregon State college.

At the meeting in Pendleton the farm leaders hope to meet farmers, bankers, and college extension workers of Oregon and southern Washington and Idaho.
