FARM BOARD HEAD TO VISIT OREGON SATURDAY

Legge and Secretary Hyde Will
Speak In Pendleton August
9; Program Announced

Bringing their ideas of the wheat situation to the farmers, bankers and editors of Oregon in person, Secretary of Agriculture A. M. Hyde and Chairman Alexander Legge of the federal farm board will speak in Pendleton August ninth at a meeting which will commence at 10:30 and continue late in the afternoon.

Final plans for the meeting have been completed by the extension service of Oregon State college which was called upon by the federal officials to make advance arrangements. President W. J. Kerr of the college will greet the visitors at Pendleton and will preside at the meeting.

Technical information and data on the world wheat situation and outlook will be given by Nils Olson, chief of the bureau of agricultural economics who is with the party. Following this a representative of Washington State college will tell of local conditions in his state.

Just before Secretary Hyde and Chairman Legge give their main address, G. R. Hyslop, head of the farm crops department at the state college, will outline the Oregon situation and point out the difficulties of substituting other crops for grain in the inland empire. The meetings will end with a question period with the two main speakers on the receiving end ready to answer all inquiries.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING ON MONDAY

We take the following from the La Grande, Ore., Daily News, in regard to the death of Andrew Van Blokland, father of Rev. Josie Blokland, who was killed by bolt during electrical storm last Monday.

The severe electrical storm which visited the valley Monday morning at about 6 o'clock, took as its toll the life of a member of one of Union county's pioneer families, Andrew Van Blokland prominent farmer living near Island City. Mr. Van Blokland had had a sick horse and, in spite of the storm, went out to the pasture to care for it. His younger sons went to the barn.

When the bolts came the boys ran to where their father had gone. He was dead then and his clothing afire. The shreds of his clothes covered a radius of 25 feet. His hat and shoes were shredded, his trousers legs, etc. The back of his hair was singed and he was burned down his neck and back.

The horse was killed by lightning according to Wilbur Zurbrick, first on the scene, and had not died from the disease. And it was not a second bolt that struck the horse according to those who were there.

The tragedy removes a man who had lived an extremely useful and upright life and all in this community; the head of a home from which has been sent a large family of splendid children; a man keenly interested in civil affairs and making large contributions to the community in which he lived; a farmer all his life and widely known because of the work he did along the line of raising the standards of livestock in this valley.

The funeral was held at 2:00 P. M., on Wednesday at Island City church. Dr. H. S. Hamilton, officiating.
