FALSE IDEAS STICK

After an erroneous statement has been repeated often it is next to impossible to eradicate it from the popular mind.

For many years the question was asked why the addition of a fish to a pail of water would not add to the weight of the bucket and its contents. Several ingenious explanations were offered, but the real reason could not be agreed upon. Finally some inquisitive skeptic weighed a bucket of water and after adding a 5-pound fish weighed it again. It weighed just five pounds more than it did before adding the fish. The question, therefore, was shown to be based upon a false assumption.

A similar situation is pointed out by the Christian Science Monitor in answer to the question of why the younger generation is so much inclined to crime. Thirteen cities reporting to the United States Children's Bureau showed that in nine of them juvenile delinquency decreased, while an increase was noted in only four.

Likewise, it is popularly supposed that crime in Chicago is more prevalent than ever before. Yet actual statistics show that crime since 1915 in that city has not increased in proportion to the increase in population.

NOT A DULL MONTH IN LAND SALES

There was nothing dull about the month of July in land settlement work on the Vale and Owyhee irrigation projects, where units must be settled in advance of water, according to the ruling laid down by Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation.

The west bench of Bully creek, on the Vale project, is scheduled to have water next and efforts are centering on colonization of this unit of 4000 acres.

A particularly pleasing report was made last week by F. B. Zutz, sales agent, of the sale of adjoining tracts of 80 acres to two brothers, A. R. and Wm. Whiting of Rupert, Idaho. They are coming here to build new homes.

California sent the most settlers in July. Randolph Foster of Bodi purchased 40 acres. A. Noble of Chowchilla found a forty he wanted on the Nyssa bench of the Owyhee; Geo. Kanrich, San Rafael, Cal., a forty on Dead Ox Flat. Leslie W. Young of Monmouth, Or., purchased an eighty on the Adrian bench; Ben Bromley of Portland an eighty on Bully creek.

This splendid settlement work is paid for by business men of Vale, Ontario, Nyssa, Harper. Members of commercial clubs compose the Vale-Owyhee Land Settlement association, the noteworthy group that directs all activities.

INFLUX OF FAMILIES INCREASED DURING JULY

Nineteen states sent a total of 105 new families to Oregon during July, who bought 7,488 acres of land and invested \$403,200, according to the monthly report of W. G. Ide, Mgr., State Chamber of Commerce. California, as usual, led in new families with 65; and New Jersey, Massachusetts, Ohio and Florida were also represented. A large number of the new families entered business in Oregon, five auto camps and stores being purchased, two grocery stores, a laundry, a hotel and other business investments made by the new people. The report also shows ten large land sales made by families sent to Oregon by the Los Angeles Office of the State Chamber, one 500-acre purchase in Klamath County being for \$22,500 and one 160-acre tract in Baker County bringing \$10,500. Hundreds of people called at the Los Angeles office for travel information on Oregon and 100 local Chambers of Commerce in Oregon cooperated to properly entertain and show the visitors the scenic spots in all parts of the state.
