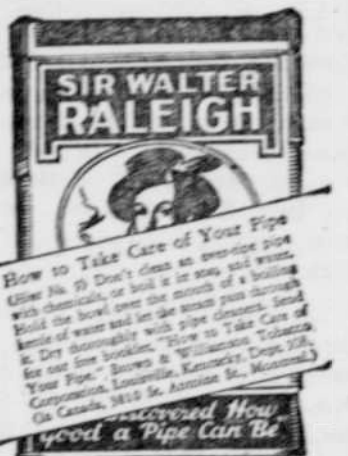

OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

Building permits in Klamath Falls for September totaled \$128,115, according to the report of the building inspector.

Under the leadership of Betty Cox, local violinist, a symphony orchestra of 15 pieces has been organized at Nehalem and is practicing regularly.

The Oregon Lumber company store at Bates was destroyed by fire recently. The store was heavily stocked and the loss was more than \$50,000.

Matrimony in Lane county is in a slump; the number of marriage licenses issued in September is the lowest for that month since 1917, only 29.

Sheriff H. L. Brown of Lane county will install a low-wave radio set within a month to receive broadcasts of crime news from the Portland police radio station.

Gordon Wiley, Deschutes county youth, won first place at the county fair in Redmond for sewing. He took second place in the livestock exhibit with his Guernsey calf.

The Harriburg grade school district finds itself, at budget time, embarrassed with a surplus of money. The new budget will be nearly a half lower than the previous one.

The Silverton Food Products company completed its long run of bean canning last week. The bean pack was started the first of August. The pack totaled more than 7000 cases.

About 300 feet of the railroad leading to the new lumber mill being constructed at Clifton, a few miles from Astoria, was demolished by a rock slide. The slide followed blasting operations.

A new automatic system for elevating sawdust from the ground up into the storage bins and also to the boiler room has been installed at the Brownville wooden mills and is operating satisfactorily.

Ashland's fire loss for the first nine months of 1930 has been only \$1170, according to Fire Chief Baughman, who added that Ashland's fire loss in 1929 had been more than \$29,000, the largest in many years.

The Northern Lake County Chamber of Commerce has been organized at Silver Lake. It will represent the interests of Chewaucan, Summer Lake, Silver Lake and Fort Rock valleys and contiguous territory.

Shooting a deer from the door of a store on a main highway is the experience of Wes Chrisman, keeper of the Bedrock store on the Row river road, one of the most heavily traveled roads in the Dorena section.

An additional unit to the plant of St. Helena Pulp & Paper company was started recently, and an additional paper machine will be installed as soon as construction work has progressed sufficiently to permit it.

Some of the most difficult road construction on the Oregon Coast highway will be encountered on the China Creek and Berry Creek sections, for which contract will be let by the bureau of federal roads, according to P. M. Morse, Lane county engineer.

Vernonia and adjacent territory has experienced one of the greatest building programs during the first nine months of 1930 that it has had since 1923. It is estimated that the cost of the buildings completed this year or in actual construction totals \$150,000.

Officials of the Columbia Gorge Mining company started boring a shaft at The Dalles Country club, where a 30-ft. vein of silver, assaying \$2000 a ton, has been discovered. If the volume reaches expectations, golfers will draw royalty checks rather than pay dues.

With a record crowd and a wealth of good farm and livestock exhibits, the annual Hermiston project fair was held recently.

As a direct outgrowth of a series of troubles had with fraternities in the Salem high school it is said that Representative McAllister will probably introduce at the coming session of the legislature a bill to repeal the law prohibiting high school fraternities.

Reports from territory surrounding Pendleton indicate that wheat ranchers have had ample rain to allow for seeding their ground. As there is prospect of further rain with little likelihood that the weather will turn dry, the situation is believed to be satisfactory.

A natural gas flow was struck on the Cecil Riggs farm in the Home Gap district, a few miles from Dallas, by drillers operating for R. E. Combs of Portland. The vein was not a heavy one, but pending the arrival of Mr. Combs the well was capped and drilling suspended.

It cost George G. Elliott Jr., whose home is between Alhambra and Pillar Rock, Wash., \$100 and the loss of his duck boat, gun, decoys and ducks to poach—that is to say, to hunt without a license—on the Oregon side of the Columbia on the opening day of the duck season.

Douglas county has just received a check from the federal government for \$129,475.16, the annual payment on the O. & C. grant lands. The government pays the "land grant" counties each year a sum equal to the taxes on the reverted lands if they had been left in private hands.

With the roofing work on the new Union Pacific depot at La Grande nearing completion, main construction work will now turn to the interior of the building, which will provide spacious waiting and baggage rooms in addition to offices for system officials and clerical forces.

Oregon still has its wild and woolly sections where locomotives are unknown. A herd of cattle recently taken to Alturas from Spring valley saw a huge monster thundering toward them. They stampeded. Six cows were killed and seven maimed so they had to be butchered.

The engineering crew engaged in a survey of the Willamette river from Oregon City to Eugene, establishing the channel, reefs, width of river and distance, and mapping the curves and contours of the country, has already proceeded from Eugene to a point beyond Corvallis, surveying about five miles each day.

According to information received by the public service commission recently the Columbia Utilities company with headquarters at Vernonia, has acquired the plant and properties of the Butte Falls & Eagle Point Telephone company at Eagle Point and the Tale Lake Telephone company in Klamath county.

Crews at the plant of The Dalles Co-operative Growers started dehydrating apples which are being shipped there from the Milton-Freewater district. A minimum of 2500 tons of apples will be dried, H. G. Miller, manager of the co-operative, said. A crew of 100 women and 20 men will be kept busy 10 weeks.

Members of the Lower Columbia Co-operative Dairy association will be paid for their September butterfat production on a basis of 43 cents a pound for grade A, 41 cents for No. 1 and 39 cents for No. 2. This price is several cents above the Portland market as the dairymen of that district receive a premium on their butterfat.

A complete sawmill in the north Silver Falls country in eastern Marion county was stolen recently and the theft was not discovered until the owner of the plant arrived to resume operations of his plant. Persons living in the vicinity of the mill said they saw men load the machinery of the mill on trucks and cart it away, but supposed that the work was being done on the orders of the owner.

Crews of the Situla national forest completed the Fiddle creek road into Douglas county recently and began work on the Big creek road north of Florence. This road will connect the interior of the forest with the coast.

Although a smaller number of non-resident motor vehicles were registered this year than in 1929, figures by the state motor vehicle department show nearly 82,000 automobiles bearing visitors and tourists to Oregon registered this year.

The new electric light plant at Oakridge has begun operations. Current is being distributed over the city of Eugene from the plant operated by diesel engines and work will be started on the hydro-electric plant above the town in a short time.

Citizens of The Dalles may expect snow-free main streets this winter, following the action of the city council in authorizing purchase of a snow blade to be erected on the front of the city truck. The blade has an 8-foot width and a 39-inch depth.

LIGHTS of NEW YORK

We had the big-saw puzzle, mah-jongg, the cross-word craze, which swept the country like a tidal wave; but it is doubtful whether any of them ever exerted as much effect on the country at large as this midget golf game has done. It has swept the hills like a winter wind and the plains like a prairie fire. One of its peculiar aspects is that, unlike most crazes, which spread from the big cities to the small towns and extended to the big ones.

Midget golf goes under many names. In some parts of the country it is called Putt-putt; in others Tee-wee; in still others Tom Thumb. There is a course just outside New York which bears the name of the Demi-Tasse Country club. But the game is the same at all of them. I am told that there is a man who holds a patent on some essential part of the outfit and that he is collecting plenty in royalties. Whether this is so, I do not know.

The value of the game is, of course, the turnover. By that I mean that the players pass around in an endless chain, and when they get to the end, either have to get out or buy another ticket, as they might on a scenic railway. Moreover, the player behind always is trying to hurry the player ahead, so there is little delay. It is a game that a man can step right in off the sidewalk and play, without changing any of his clothes or making any special preparation. It also is a game that a boy can play with his girl, and at which she has an equal chance.
