BEANS AND PEAS NEXT YEAR CROP MALHEUR VALLEY

Baby Lima beans, Burtner's blightless beans and Austrian winter peas have occupied the center of the Malheur county farm stage the past two weeks.

County Agent Larson has just completed a series of meetings in six communities, Oregon Slope, Nyssa, Big Bend, Vale, Cairo and Harper. Assisting were Otto Fowler, manager of the Caldwell Bean Growers Association and Gus Hagglund, assistant county agent. Meetings in practically all cases were very well attended and those in attendance indicated they would plant 146 acres of Austrian peas and 189 acres of beans. These crops will replace some of the unwanted wheat acreage.

Meetings were devoted mainly to discussion of cultural practices in handling the crop. According to those conducting the meetings, land for beans should be fall plowed and allowed to lay rough during the winter. This land should preferably be corn or grain land; as alfalfa or clover sod is apt to contain too much fertility resulting in too large a vine growth and a small set of beans. Cultivation should start in the spring just as soon as the weeds begin to show. All the weeds possible should be killed before the beans are planted, planting time from May 15 to May 25. Planting should be done with a four-row planter and a four-row cultivator should be used in cultivation.

Rows are spaced from 20 to 24 inches apart. Irrigation is given to

every other row, the same rows being irrigated throughout the entire season. Harvesting is done with a four row cutter, threshing with a stationary thrasher or a bean combine.

In the case of the Austrian winter peas the land should be fall plowed as the peas are planted in the spring just as soon as the land is in shape—the earlier the better. The crop is then handled like a grain crop and may be harvested with a mower and ordinary grain thrashing outfit. A Willamette Valley firm is offering contracts at 31-4c per pound for the peas. As a result of demonstration plantings made this year it would seem that a yield of 2000 pounds or better per acre might be expected.

These are only a few high-lights brought out by these meetings. Anyone interested in growing either crop can secure full information from the county agent's office.
