MALHEUR CROP SURPRISES

Larger Crop This Year in Malheur
County Estimate—Price Outlook
Encouraging

A series of turkey marketing meetings were held last week by the Idaho-Oregon turkey growers association cooperating with R. G. Larson, county agent. George McKnight of Vale, president of the association, and Mrs. C. G. Brink, secretary, discussed marketing of this year's turkey crop and told growers that in view of information now available they believed prices equal to or a little better than last year could be expected due to the fact that cold storage stocks are practically exhausted and importations were very small.

The Northwest Turkey growers were discussed at these meetings. The northwest corporation is a consolidation of marketing organizations now in existence but it was apparent the general consensus of opinion is that the Idaho-Oregon pool should market as in past years. One change in policy of the Idaho-Oregon is in grading of the birds. This provides for a grade in addition to the No. 1 and No. 2 used in the past—an intermediate grade for birds which meet the requirements of No. 1 grade in everything except weight. The intermediate grade takes care of light weight birds and it is expected the price will be about two cents lower than No. 1.

Mrs. Brink expressed a great deal of surprise at the number of turkeys there are in Malheur county this year. It appears that there are fully as many or more than last year. In

the remainder of this organization's territory, however, the crop seems to be lighter but the quality of the birds throughout the entire district is exceptionally good.

In addition an immense sign measuring 12 feet across and giving striking highlights about this section will be placed in a central location of the booth. The undertaking is sponsored by the Vale-Owyhee land settlement association which has designated Gus Hagglund, assistant county agent, and E. B. Conklin to assume charge of arrangements.

Cross State Rail Rehearing Dec. 9

Rehearing of the cross-state railroad case before the federal court in Portland, is necessitated by the death of Judge Dietrich who sat with Judges Bean and McNary in the first hearing.

Judge Rudkin, who is to sit with Bean and McNary in the rehearing, informed the other judges that any date after December 4 would be satisfactory to him, and Judge Bean has written him suggesting that the rehearing start Tuesday, December 9. Attorneys appearing in the case for the Oregon public service commission and the Idaho utilities commission will file their briefs in the case within 10 days.

The official checking of registered voters in Malheur county has been completed by Roy Daley, county clerk, and shows a total of 4,454—99 more than the 4,355 registered voters at the May primaries. Of the total, 3,079 registered republican; 1,248 for the democratic ticket; others miscellaneous.
