## Memorial to First Printer

A fund has been established at Weimar, Germany, for the erection of a memorial to be known as the "Temple of the Letter" in honor of Gutenberg's discovery of movable type. The memorial, the cornerstone of which it is planned to lay in 1940, the fifth centenary of his invention, will be placed over Gutenberg's grave at Mainz. It is planned to enlist international co-operation for the building of the temple, which is intended to constitute evidence of the world's gratitude to the father of books, magazines and newspapers. The movement was initiated by the Society of Bibliophiles of Weimar.

Poultrymen from all over the lower Columbia district gathered at Astoria recently for the annual poultry meeting.

The Redmond branch of the Deschutes library in December showed a gain of almost four times over that of a year ago.

Postmaster Charles Halderman reports a general increase in business at Astoria for 1939. Postal receipts last year, he said, were \$64,410.39.

Plans for a highway through the Siskiyou national forest from Powers to Ilwaco and thence up Rogue river to Grants Pass are now in progress.

The city of Seaside will soon call for bids for cleaning the streets. The council will also reconstruct the present inadequate lighting system along the Prom.

Approximately 250 men will be put to work on the roads of Clatsop county in a few days, it was stated by George Gray, district engineer of the state highway commission.

Svensen's cannery is undergoing extensive remodeling. Bollman & Hurlay, owners, packed the largest amount of evergreen blackberries last year ever put out at the cannery.

Barring milk produced outside of Lane county from Eugene is asked by the Eugene Milk Producers' association as a movement toward the stabilization of prices paid to producers by distributors.

James E. McClintock, the mayor of Roseburg, in his message to the city council demanded better and cheaper public utility service, economy in municipal affairs and strict enforcement of the laws.

W. F. King of Prineville has been elected chairman of the board of directors of the Ochoco irrigation district for the coming year. Glen Cox will continue as secretary and manager of the district.

Forty-one seal scalps brought A. D. Winegar of Cushman \$102.50, Lane county bounty. The state bounty of \$10 will bring him \$410 more. The seals were taken on the Lane county coast near Florence.

Clearing for the Westfir market road in Lane county is practically completed. The road will be an outlet for the mill town to the Willamette highway, with which it will connect at Hell Gate bridge.

E. B. Fish and his son are building a cranberry bog east of Bandon and south of the Oregon Coast highway. They have about four acres of suitable bog and hope to have it all in plants in the near future.

Dairy cows entered for testing in the Malheur Dairy Herd Improvement association rank second in Oregon from the standpoint of butterfat produced by the animal, recent figures released by the dairy department of the Oregon State college indicate. Linn-Benton is high with 27.11 pounds a cow, and Malheur follows with an even 27 pounds in one month.

Clatsop county produced over a million narcissus and daffodil bulbs during the last year. The industry is slated to double during the coming year if the embargo against importation of foreign grown bulbs is maintained.

Immediate construction of 14 new mess halls and two combination bath houses at Camp Clatsop was authorized in a telegram received by Major General White from the war department. The new buildings will cost \$20,000.

The Lebanon post office showed a healthy growth during 1939 over the preceding year, and the business done for the year was the largest of any year in the history of the office.

Oral arguments on the application of the Sumpter Valley Railroad company to abandon its line between Bates and Prairie City, in Baker county, will be heard by the interstate commerce commission at Washington, February 25.

The contract for the long tunnel through the mountain on the Umpqua highway a short distance west of Elkton is expected to be let by the state highway commission in a short time, according to R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest.

Officials of the Cascade Box company of Klamath Falls, whose plant was completely destroyed by fire on New Year's night, state that they will rebuild the plant within 75 days. The loss was \$40,000 and the new plant will be valued at a like amount.

Mrs. Ella Schultz Wilson was re-elected secretary of the Oregon state fair board at a session held recently. Mrs. Wilson has been secretary since 1924. A. C. Marsters of Roseburg was re-elected president of the state fair board for the fourth consecutive term.

A hog died of freight near The Dalles recently. A. C. Nielson had prepared to butcher two hogs. When he shot one in the head with a rifle, porker No. 2, several feet away, also dropped, kicked his heels a few times and passed on, without a scratch on his body.

O. J. Amundson of the Rainier farming district will sow a ten-acre field to flax this fall, the harvest to be used for seed. This is the first flax to be raised in the district, and if the crop is successful, as soil experts predict, a larger acreage will be planted next year.

During the last biennium 1343 ex-service men have taken advantage of the loan privileges of the Oregon soldiers' bonus act to borrow a total of \$2,857,300, according to the biennial report of Frank M. Moore, executive secretary to the World War Veterans' state aid commission.

A check for \$41,806.39, the balance due Douglas county turkey growers for birds shipped during December by managers of the pool, has been received. The total amount received from the sale of December turkeys, which totaled slightly more than 16 carloads, was \$112,914.55.

While the Oregon motorist has until July 1 to worry about paying his 1931 license fee, fliers are not so lucky. Oregon aviators, in common with others over the country, already are securing 1931 plates. Secretary of State Hoss has received 75 plates to be issued to aviators who fly within the state.

Sales of Umpqua valley turkeys for breeding purposes have increased from 300 to 400 per cent since the annual northwestern turkey show was instituted three years ago, according to J. C. Leedy, county agent and secretary of the Douglas County Turkey Breeders' association, which sponsors the annual show.

Decoy geese may also be used for coyotes. Richard Miller of Klamath Falls bagged a coyote while goose hunting. The decoys had been set out and Miller was hiding in a blind when the coyote attacked the fake birds. Miller shot him with the goose load before the animal was disillusioned by the pasteboard decoys.

Oren Sudtelt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sudtelt, suffered with a "splitting headache." He went to an Albany doctor, who found a grain of barley pressing against the ear drum. The head of barley had gone into his ear last fall. Sudtelt thought it had been extracted. The sheath had, leaving the seed, which had started to grow.

The Alsea cheese factory burned to the ground recently. Cause of the blaze is unknown. The factory had been shut down for three weeks, but had been reopened and was in operation at the time of the fire. A large stock of finished product was in the building at the time of the fire. The loss is estimated at \$5000. The plant will be rebuilt.

After a term of nearly twenty-five years as president of the Linfield college at McMinnville, Dr. L. W. Riley tendered his resignation to the board of trustees. The resignation, which is to take effect on March 1, 1931, was accepted by the board, but a request was made that Dr. Riley continue his duties as honorary president until the end of the school year.

Deschutes county's expenditures for indigent relief, widows' pensions and other charity work during 1939 totaled about \$21,000. The largest single item of expenditure was the maintenance of the county hospital, about \$6000.

Nothing interfering, the rails of the Oregon Electric railroad will reach Sweet Home soon. Had it not been for several delays caused by soft fills and an inadequate supply of ballast the steel would have reached there some time ago.

FOR THE BUSY HOUSEKEEPER

In many homes fresh cookies are so much more enjoyed than a large amount baked at one time. Here is the ice-box cookie which may be kept many days and when a tin of fresh cookies is wanted, slice off a few, put them in the oven and bake them as brown as you like.

Ice Box Cookies.—Take one cupful each of butter, brown and granulated sugar, two eggs, one teaspoonful each of salt and soda, one cupful of nutmeats, one teaspoonful each of almond and vanilla extract and four and one-fourth cupfuls of flour. Cream the butter, add the sugar, eggs and other ingredients. Roll into two rolls and let stand on a cloth in a pan placed in the ice box. The cloth keeps the dough from flattening and sticking to the pan and thus losing its round shape. Slice very thin, decorate with half a nut meat, a raisin or cherry as one's taste suggests.

Another food so much liked in all our homes is fresh rolls. It takes time to prepare a light and crisp roll. Here is a recipe which will keep for a week or longer in the ice chest and a pan of biscuits may be baked any time one cares to serve them:

Ice Box Rolls.—Dissolve two compressed yeast cakes in one-fourth of a cupful of warm water, adding two teaspoonfuls of shortening, one teaspoonful of salt, one-half cupful of sugar to a pint of boiling water. Beat two eggs and mix all together with four cupfuls of flour. Beat well, then add three and one-half cupfuls more of flour, mix well with a spoon but do not knead. Set away in the refrigerator until the next day at noon, when it will be ready to use. Handle the rolls quickly, brush with melted lard or sweet fat when they are placed in the pan. Let stand until more than double their bulk; keep covered while rising in a warm place.

With these two mixtures in the ice box, one may be ready for the unexpected and need not worry.

World Pays Tribute to Shrine of Bobby Burns

Many places have been "made" by the genius of a great writer. Scott has done more for the tourist agencies and the railways of England than any of his countrymen, because his range was so wide. He discovered the Trossachs and Loch Katrine, and even made the Peak of Derbyshire world-famous. But there are no more halloved spots than those which dot the Burns country.

The country town of Ayr lies in the center of a fine sandy coast, with wonderful sea view across the great firth. There is no house in the kingdom, no palace or castle or great mansion, that has half the attraction for the world as the little thatched bignin at Alloway where Robert Burns was born. In its visitors' book are inscribed the names of men and women famous in literature, art and statecraft, the names of peers and peasants and of kings, all come to worship at the shrine of genius.

Close by is the Auld Brig o' Doon, leaping in a single gray and graceful span the little stream whose name has gone round the world. Close by, too, is the haunted kirk, where Tam o' Shanter saw witches and warlocks holding revelry in its churchyard. In the town itself can still be seen the Auld Brig of Ayr, the theme of one of his finest poems, whilst the river Ayr is forever associated with the ode.
