Dairy Notes

Milk is approximately 87 per cent water. Too often water is looked upon simply as something to quench thirst.

Roughage is the backbone of the real dairy ration. It determines, to a large extent, the feed cost of producing milk.

A calf well started is a calf half grown. It takes a long time to overcome a setback that a calf may get in the first few days or weeks of its life.

The owner of a low producing dairy herd has no choice—he must send the poorest cows to the butcher, or else he will find himself working for nothing, or less than nothing.

If water is handy cows drink in proportion to the way they milk. If not, then cows milk in proportion to the way they drink.

If cows cannot have water at will or cannot fill up on it two or three times per day they must come down in milk production.

Distance is no handicap in dairy record clubs. A box of samples taken in Holland recently reached the testing laboratory in Wisconsin in good condition, after a 21-day trip.

Dairy Facts

The calf can be taught to drink by allowing it to suck the fingers and gradually lowering them into the milk.

One cow often eats the profits made by another. Feed each cow according to her production. A high producing cow needs much more grain than a low producer.

Cows need vacations the same as human beings. A rest period of six to eight weeks before freshening, with plenty of good feed, will put the dairy cow in form for her work.

Many cows must get their water a long way from the barn on cold winter days and often the ice must be removed before they can drink. Under these conditions cows cannot fill up on water as they should, with a resultant decrease in milk.

A cow is so constituted as to handle large amounts of roughage, but even so, a cow's capacity is limited. If she is fed a poor grade of roughage her energy is expended in consuming a class of feeds from which she cannot get sufficient nutritive returns.

Feed for Calf

A common fault in feeding calves during the first month is to feed too much milk. This is especially true during the first few days. The milk from the dam is not yet fit for human consumption. There is a lot of it. The tendency is to be liberal with the calf to the calf's hurt. The stomach of the little creature is adapted to milk little and often. Overfilling brings on indigestion and scours. The very largest calf should not get over eight pounds of milk daily for the first week.
