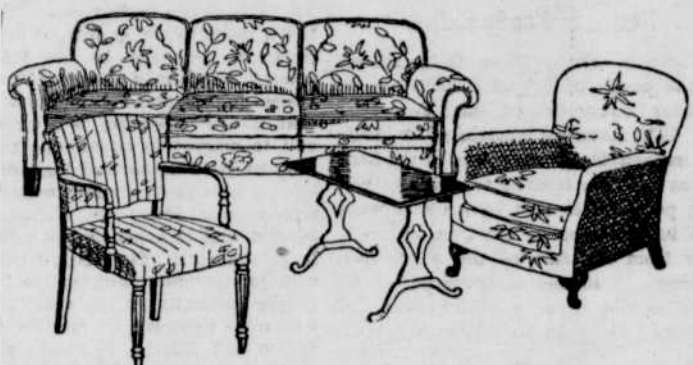

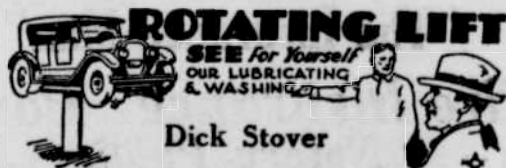

TO E. B. CLARK, A. A. HOLLANDER, E. R. BERG and J. W. WOOD, and each thereof, and to all the heirs at law, next of kin, legatees and devisees, of any, of said defendants.

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON:

You, and each of you, are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the expiration of four weeks after the service of this summons upon you; and if you so fail to answer for want thereof, plaintiff will take judgment against you for the relief prayed for in the complaint on file herein, to-wit:

For an order and decree of this Court that the defendants, and each thereof, may be required to set forth the nature of his or her claim in and to the following described real property: Lots Sixteen (16), Seventeen (17), Eighteen (18), Nineteen (19) and Twenty (20), in Block Ten (10), of the Original Townsite of the Town of Nyssa, County of Malheur, State of Oregon, as the same is shown and appears on the Revised General Map of said Town of Nyssa, now on file in the office of the County Clerk of said County and State.

And that all adverse claims of said defendants, and each thereof, may be determined by an order and decree of this Court.

That by a decree of this Court it be declared, ordered and decreed that the said plaintiff now is, and his grantors and predecessors ever since the 2nd day of November, 1892, have been the owners in fee simple and in the continuous possession of said real property.

That by a decree of this Court it be declared, ordered and decreed that the said defendants, E. B. Clark and A. A. Hollander, have no right, title, claim or interest in and to said premises by reason of said agreement of sale, described and set forth in paragraph 3 of the complaint on file herein, and that said agreement of sale be cancelled, held for naught, void and of no further force and effect.

That by an order of this Court it be declared, ordered and decreed that the said defendant, J. W. Wood, has failed and neglected to comply with the terms of the said sales contract set forth in paragraph 4 of said complaint, and has failed and neglected to make the payments therein provided on his part to be made, kept and performed, and by reason thereof, has breached said contract, and each and every of the terms thereof, and that any right, title, claim or interest of said defendant, J. CHEMICALS USED
TO CLEAN CANS

Chlorinated Lime Is Good in
Killing Bacteria.

Chemicals may be used instead of hot water in sterilizing milk utensils, and many farmers are finding this an easy method of keeping milk cans and other dairy equipment clean and sanitary, says L. H. Burgwald, professor of dairy technology at the Ohio State university.

Chlorinated lime, which may be procured in 12-ounce cans, is commonly used for this purpose. In preparing the chemical for use in sterilizing milk utensils, one 12-ounce can of chlorinated lime is thoroughly dissolved in a gallon of water, the clear solution is syphoned off, stored in a tightly stoppered glass bottle and placed in a cool dark place. In the presence of sunlight the solution rapidly loses its strength.

After milking, Burgwald states, the utensils are immediately rinsed with cold water and then washed with hot water containing a washing powder (not a soap powder). After the milk utensils have been thoroughly washed with the hottest water possible to handle, they are then rinsed with a solution made by adding a half-glass of the chlorine solution to five gallons of water.

The chemical is effective in killing bacteria if the milk cans are clean, but if they are dirty it will do but little good. Cans returned from the milk plants or creameries may be rinsed with the chlorinated lime solution and then drained just before milking time.

Good Practice to Supply It
With Silage.

Alfalfa plays an important part in the ration for the dairy cow. When fed with silage it should be about one-fourth of the entire ration; that is, one pound of alfalfa hay for each three pounds of silage fed. If alfalfa is fed in a combination with other roughages which are dry, then it should be about one-half of the ration consumed.

It is a good practice to feed alfalfa with silage, for silage has other beneficial effects, such as adding succulence to the ration. To a certain extent the silage takes the place of green pasture grasses.

A very well balanced dairy ration where alfalfa and silage are fed is one pound of alfalfa to three pounds of silage. This combination leaves but one reason why something else should be added to the ration, and that is the fact that not enough pounds of food nutrients can be consumed in these roughages to supply the needs of a heavy producing dairy cow. To meet this need it is necessary for the dairyman to feed grain.

When alfalfa and silage are the roughages used by a dairy cow the recommended grain ration includes four parts corn chop; two parts of oats chop, and one part cottonseed meal. The dairyman may substitute for his corn chop barley, kafir, or milo seed. In the place of oats he may substitute bran, and in place of cottonseed meal, linseed meal whenever any of these products are cheaper than those named in the ration.

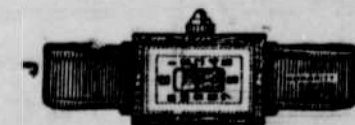
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
