Added Fund to Permit Continuation of Work

The Idaho Legislature has forwarded a memorial to congress urging that five million dollars be added to the reclamation fund to permit continuation of work on projects under construction and in this way stimulate business in general.

Idaho now has an old age pension law in the signing of H. R. 22. The following measures introduced in the legislature may be examined in detail if you will write your legislative representative for a complete copy.

Introduced in the House

H. B. 157, by revenue and taxation committee—Amending section 327 of the compiled statutes of Idaho relating to the ad valorem and special taxes against counties.

H. B. 158, by revenue and taxation committee—Amending section 3267.

A, which is a new section added to chapter 144 of the Idaho compiled statutes by section 5 of chapter 203 of the Idaho session laws of 1923 relating to the time of the meeting and duties of the county board of equalization *** relating to assessment of migratory livestock *** relating to rebate and adjustment in the home county of taxes on migratory livestock.

H. B. 159, by ways and means committee—Providing for the licensing of the sellers of cigarettes and cigarette papers, fixing the amount of such license and bond to be given by the sellers; providing for the taxing of cigarettes and cigarette papers and the manner of doing so, and providing a penalty.

H. B. 160, by appropriations committee—Making an appropriation for the payment of salaries, wages and other expenses of the Grand Army of the Republic and Veterans' Welfare commission, for the period 1931-32 and declaring an emergency.

H. B. 161, by charitable and penal institutions committee—To amend the law in reference to the Idaho insane asylums located at Blackfoot and Orofino *** placing the management and control of said asylums under the department of public welfare, and prescribing the powers and duties of the commission of public welfare ***

H. B. 162, by ways and means committee—Amending section 28 of chapter 256 of the Idaho session laws of 1921 as amended by section 11 of chapter 45 of the Idaho session laws, 1925, relating to depositing of public funds in public depositories, subject to payment on demand or placed upon time deposit.

H. B. 163, by highway committee—An act releasing owners of motor vehicles from responsibility for injuries to passengers, also responsibility of a public carrier or operator of a motor vehicle while the same is being demonstrated to prospective purchaser.

H. B. 164, by military committee—Relating to powers granted to boards of county commissioners to levy special tax for maintaining service men's memorials.

H. B. 165, by aeronautics committee—Uniform state law on aeronautics.

H. B. 166, by aeronautics committee—Amending air commerce act of 1929 and adopting principles of federal air commerce of 1929.

H. B. 167, by banking committee—Limiting resumption as to deeds and mortgages when name of grantee is followed by word trustee or agent.

H. B. 168, by educational committee—Prescribing oath of allegiance and loyalty to the United States and Idaho for public school teachers.

H. B. 169, by counties' committee—Amending chapter 131, 1925 laws, to provide for formation of fair districts of two or more counties on vote of 51 per cent.

H. B. 170, by health committee—Authorizing department of public welfare to furnish county physicians with vaccines and antitoxins for scarlet fever, typhoid, diphtheria and small pox for children; appropriating \$2500.

H. B. 171, by library committee—Amending sections 6512-14-15-16 to make women eligible for service on juries.

H. B. 172, by library committee—Designating syringa (Philadelphus lewisii) as state flower.

H. B. 173, by library committee—Designating mountain bluebird (Sialia arctica) as state bird.

H. B. 174, by highways committee—An act on uniform operators' and chauffeurs' license act.

H. B. 175, by banking committee—On deposit of moneys of the state in banks and trust.

H. B. 176, by banking committee—Concerning statements of account between bank and depositor.

H. B. 177, by education committee—Authorizing the boards of trustees of school districts to make their purchases through the central purchasing agent.

H. B. 178, by fish and game committee—Relating to conservation of fish and game.

H. B. 179, by appropriations committee—Appropriation for payment of premiums of official bonds, land-department (blister rust), public institutions, insane asylums, sheep commission.

SAVORY MEAT DISHES

The following are a few meat dishes which are prepared in ways that are different:

Braised Mutton.—Take three pounds of the breast of mutton—shoulder or loin may be used. Remove the surplus fat and cut the meat into strips. Lay four slices of bacon in a casserole, add the meat and brown well on all sides. Cover the meat with sliced lemon and four more slices of bacon. Add one small onion sliced thin, three carrots sliced, one cupful of celery diced. Pour over one cupful of soup stock and add salt and pepper. Cover closely and bake two and one-half hours. Tomato with a half teaspoonful of sugar may be substituted for the soup stock.

Braised Oxtails.—Wash thoroughly three oxtails cut into pieces. Dredge with flour and brown in the fat to which a slice of onion has been added. Add two cupfuls of tomatoes and water to cover, one teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper, four whole cloves and a few grains of mace. Simmer for three hours closely covered. Remove the oxtails, thicken the gravy and serve with the gravy poured over the oxtails. More salt will be needed to season the meat during the cooking.

Tripe Roll.—For those who are fond of tripe this recipe will be welcome: Take two pounds of tripe in one piece (boiled). Boil, mash and season four large potatoes, add a tablespoonful of chopped onion, two cupfuls of soft bread crumbs, one-half of a green pepper chopped, one pint of salt and pepper and paprika to taste. Mix this mixture and spread over the tripe, roll tightly and tie with string. Roll in melted fat and flour and lay on strips of bacon. Bake for an hour in a hot oven and serve in slices with tomato sauce.
