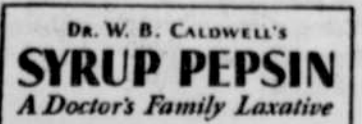

—Briefly Told for Busy Readers

BIG SUM FROM FOREST SCHOOL FOR FARMERS ROAD BUILDING PLAN OGDEN ROAD WORK

ST. ANTHONY, IDA.—Total receipts of the Targhee national forest were \$63,145.00 during the first half of the fiscal year 1931, virtually double those of any of the 25 other forests in the Intermountain region, according to a report issued by the forest headquarters here.

RICHFIELD, UT.—Through the U. S. A. C. extension service, a farm account school will be held in Richfield early in March, which will give an opportunity for twenty-five farmers to get help on taking a farm inventory, keeping farm accounts and other figures on their transactions.

ST. GEORGE, UT.—An appropriation of \$150 from the miscellaneous road fund was made by the county commission for the improvement of the Sugar Loaf road and a larger sum was appropriated for graveling the county road running through the Washington field.

OGDEN, UT.—At a total cost of \$10,000, road improvement work is to be carried on in Ogden canyon by the state highway commission. The improvement will include the removal of rock points opposite the Lewis camp and one near Hermitage and one near Pine View.

SPRINGVILLE, UT.—The 1930 vital statistics report shows that the births almost doubled the number of deaths.

PRICE, UT.—A report has been received that the postoffice department will establish a rural free delivery service at Spring Glen, to serve approximately eight hundred persons.

LOGAN, UT.—The rebuilding of the Commercial block, which was recently destroyed by a \$50,000 fire, has already begun.

BLACKFOOT, IDA.—The new pipe organ was dedicated anew when Prof. E. P. Kimball, of Salt Lake gave a concert for a large attendance from nearby cities.

CARSON CITY, NEV.—A bill providing for "wide-open" gambling, regarded as Nevada's latest bid to increase the popularity of its divorce colony at Reno has been introduced in the legislature.

BURLEY, IDA.—This city and surrounding territory has shipped two carloads of produce to the sufferers in the drought areas of Arkansas.

MOSCOW, IDA.—A \$20,000 fire drove seven families out in the cold, on short notice a short time ago.

HAILEY, IDA.—The Wood river territory has more snow this year than during 1930. The moisture record of 1931 exceeds by nearly seven inches the record of the previous season.

IDAHO FALLS, IDA.—The Upper Snake River Dairymen's cooperative creamery has been dedicated here. The structure cost \$115,000, and was visited on dedication day by five thousand people.

LAS VEGAS, NEV.—Construction will be started soon on the first unit of the residential section at Boulder City. Official opening of bids on the first 12 houses will be held March 13.

BLACKFOOT, IDA.—Auditor G. B. Moon has reported a shortage of \$2640, said to be in the records of former assessor Murdock.

ABERDEEN, IDA.—A sheep test in feeding methods on five hundred lambs has been conducted at the state University at Moscow. Local sheep men have been hearing the results of this test.

HAILEY, IDA.—It has been reported that Blaine county sheepmen will have a lamb wool pool to be worked out in cooperation with lamb pool associations in Lincoln and Gooding counties, which have been selling by this method for several years.

MANTI, UT.—\$5000 will be expended on repair work on the Ferron canyon from Ferron, to Manti. Engineers of the forest service have been inspecting this project and report that work will be pushed as rapidly as weather conditions permit.

LOGAN, UT.—Cache Valley Boy Scout troop 10 is planning to build a 40x60 foot cabin as a home for their troop on the same lot with the ward chapel. This is one of the most pretentious projects ever attempted by a Cache Valley troop of scouts.

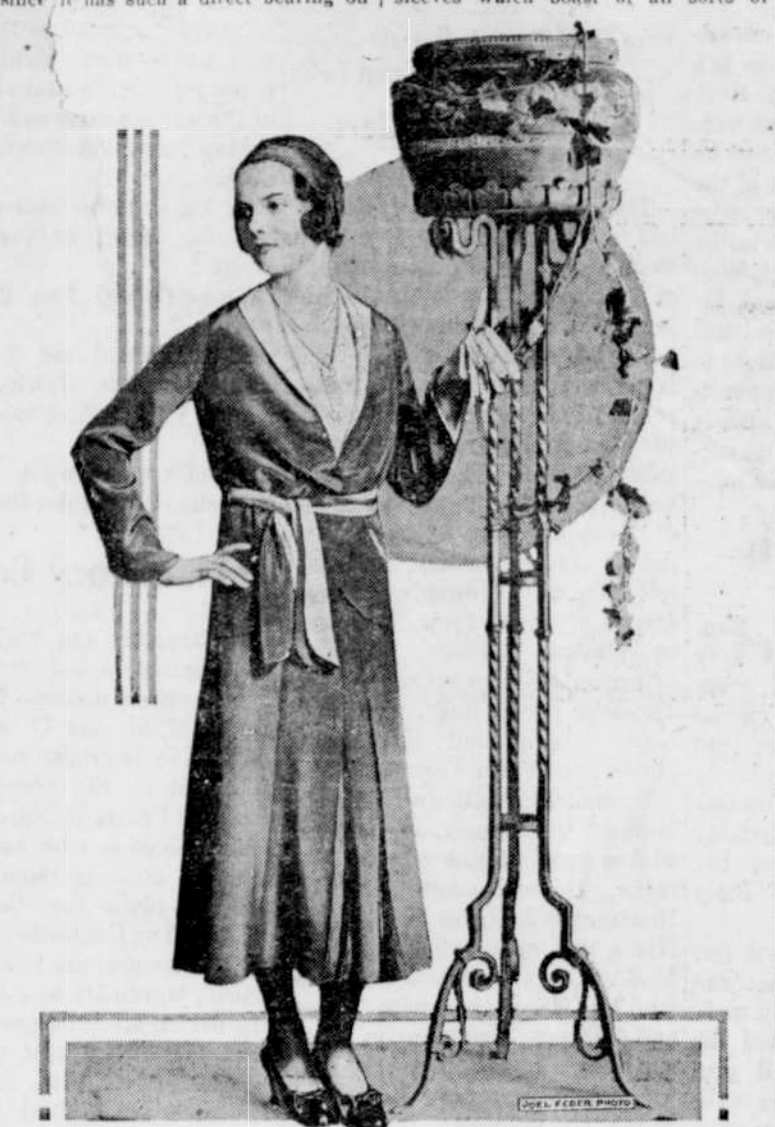
MOSCOW, IDA.—Several Idaho mining outfits are increasing activities at this time in spite of the low prices of metals, which indicates that steadier work is in prospect for workmen during the coming season.

BRIGHAM CITY, UT.—A group of twenty-five taxpayers from various parts of the county met at the chamber of commerce recently to discuss tax measures before the legislature and ascertain which measures Box Elder people favored and to convey this information to the legislature.

RICHFIELD, UT.—Lack of finances will cause an earlier closing, than usual of Sevier county schools. Taxes of 1930 are about one-half delinquent.

Idaho Legislature Has A Full Quota

The Idaho legislature has a full quota of measures to consider in the remainder of the present session.

Following is a list of proposed laws that may interest you and if a complete copy of any of them is desired, it may be obtained by writing to your representatives in the legislature.

Introduced In The Senate:

S. B. 93, by highways, bridges and ferries committee—Providing for dissolution and consolidation of good roads districts.

S. B. 94, by highways, bridges and ferries committee—Companion bill to S. B. 93, providing for dissolution and consolidation of highway districts.

S. B. 95, by highways, bridges and ferries committee—Companion bill to S. B. 93 and 94, relating to limitations of good roads district boundaries and defining powers of good roads district commissioners.

S. B. 96, by banks and banking committee—Making drawing of instruments on fictitious bank, corporation, partnership or individual forgery.

S. B. 97, by counties and county boundaries committee—Relates to an election on question of annexation of part of Owyhee county by Ada county.

S. B. 98, by judiciary committee—Amending statutes relating to fees of jurors and witnesses by providing traveling expenses of 25 cents per mile and salary of \$2 per day.

S. B. 99, by state affairs committee—Amending the workmen's compensation act.

S. J. R. 6, by state affairs committee—Providing for referring to people of amendment to constitution to place industrial accident board under jurisdiction of supreme court.

S. B. 100, by mines and mining committee—Requiring filing with Idaho bureau of mines and geology geologic information derived from well drilling operations.

S. B. 101, by fish and game committee—Providing that state game warden shall be elected biennially by the governor.

S. B. 102, by state affairs committee—Providing that public utilities commission may issue or refuse to issue permits to auto transportation companies on grounds of public convenience and necessity.

S. B. 103, by judiciary committee—Providing that county commissioners shall not be required to sell lands taken over on tax deeds until 1933.

Introduced In The House:

H. B. 236, by appropriation committee—Providing for construction of new buildings and other work of building at the Idaho "State Hospital South," at Blackfoot.

H. B. 237, by municipalities committee—Relating to duties of municipalities regarding livestock.

H. B. 238, by municipalities committee—Providing for regulation for dwelling purposes on lakes or navigable rivers.

H. B. 239, by education committee—Relating to tax levy of unorganized school districts.

H. B. 240, by state affairs committee—Providing that boards of county commission be empowered to fix compensation for use on county business of privately owned autos.

H. B. 241, by appropriations committee—Making an appropriation of \$25,000 for the University of Idaho, southern branch, \$15,000 of which is to be expended to complete the equipment of the science building thereat and \$10,000 to purchase additional land; and declaring an emergency.

H. B. 242, by printing committee—Amending section 134 of the compiled statutes relating to the printing, publication and distribution of the session laws and resolutions passed and enacted by any legislature; and amending section 135 of the compiled statutes relating to the duties of the secretary of state; and providing certain duties for the joint printing committee of any session of the legislature and for the secretary of state.

H. B. 243, by appropriations committee—Providing \$225,000 to construct, furnish and equip a library building at the University of Idaho at an expense of not to exceed \$225,000; providing for raising the cost of same by loan by the state of Idaho of \$225,000 and declaring an emergency.

H. B. 244, by the state affairs committee—An act creating a state bureau of criminal identification.

H. B. 245, by appropriations committee—Appropriating \$24,557 for department of finance.

H. B. 246, by appropriation committee—Appropriation for industrial accident board for \$43,346.

H. B. 248, by highways committee—Requiring annual itemized financial statements of highway districts.

H. B. 249, by state affairs committee—Defining fiscal year for counties, providing a budget system for making and controlling county estimates, tax levies and expenditures.
