

Notice of Election

Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation District
Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held on the 14th day of March, 1931, at the residence of J. T. Long, within the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation District, in Malheur County, Oregon, at which there will be submitted to the electors of said District, the question whether said District shall be authorized to enter into contract with the United States providing for the furnishing of power by the United States to the District from the Black Canyon Power Plant, and for the sharing of the financial benefits to be derived therefrom, with the other districts and the land owners under the Gwyhee project.

A copy of the draft of said proposed contract is on file with the secretary of the District and may be examined by any person interested.

The polls shall be opened at 8:00 o'clock in the morning of the day of the election and kept open until 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon when the same must be closed.

At such election the ballots shall contain the words, "Contract with the United States—Yes", and, "Contract with the United States—No".

Said election shall be held and the results thereof determined in all respects as nearly as practicable in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of irrigation district officers.

Edinburgh, Scotland. — First-class passengers of the night train to King's Cross station, London, can now enjoy hot and cold shower baths.

The first hot and cold shower bath to be installed on a railroad train in Great Britain became a feature of the L. N. E. R. Edinburgh-to-London run January 5.

Water from a 75-gallon tank suspended beneath the coach is pumped, at a constant pressure through six sprays and a head spray in the bath cabinet.

Compartments measure 4 feet 6 inches, by 6 feet, 5 inches. The bath cabinet is 2 feet 1 inch square.

A small table, a cork-seated chair, three electric lights, a towel rail and a steam radiator complete the equipment.

The charge made is 1 shilling.

DAIRY

SUGGESTS THREE
GRAIN MIXTURES

Corn, Oats, Bran and Cottonseed for Dairy Cows.

Feeding dairy cows rations that make for economical milk production is one sure way to cut high feeding costs, states S. M. Salisbury, specialist in animal husbandry at the Ohio State university, who suggests that the most economical grain mixture under present prices consists of corn, oats, bran and cottonseed meal.

When alfalfa hay is available, he recommends that the grain mixture be made up of three parts each of corn, oats, and bran, with one part of cottonseed. But if clover or mixed hay is fed, the ration might be modified to 2 parts each of corn, oats, and bran, and 1 part of cottonseed meal. A good grain mixture to feed with timothy hay consists of equal parts of corn, oats, bran, oil meal and cottonseed meal. These rations may be fed with or without silage at the rate of 1 pound for each 5 or 4 pounds of milk produced.

The most practical method of providing a grain ration for dairy cattle is to feed one of the suggested rations to the entire milking herd, according to Salisbury. If one cow tends to become fat and her milk production falls off too early it is well to add a little extra high protein feed to her ration. This has a tendency to stimulate milk production rather than the accumulation of fat.

If another cow is milking heavily and has a tendency to become too thin, it is best to add extra corn and oats or other high carbohydrate feeds to her ration. It is not practical, he points out, to attempt to make a separate grain mixture for each cow.

As there are about \$7.5 pounds of water in every 100 pounds of milk and as a cow consumes three pounds of water for every pound of milk she produces, it is essential that she drink plenty of water, Salisbury says. In cold weather water cups in the barn are oftentimes responsible for a 10 to 15 per cent difference in milk production.

Ohio Students' Clinic

Cures Many Mental Ills

Columbus, Ohio.—A clinic for students suffering from mental ills has been established at Ohio State university.

Trained psychologists are maintained by the clinic to give their help to those depressed by worries, foolish inhibitions, complexes, and financial matters. No fee is charged and the results are encouraging, according to Dr. Emily L. Stogdill, in charge of the clinic.

Some of the cases handled by the clinic are no more serious than attacks of timidity or inability to make friends. Others pertain to sickness and financial difficulties.

The clinic co-operates with campus health, social, and religious organizations in aiding the student body. Disciplinary cases frequently are handled by the clinic.

LID MAY BLOW OFF IN MANY PRISONS

Penal Expert Says Reforms Are Imperative.

New York.—There are twenty prisons in the United States where the lid may blow off at any minute, where death and destruction are ready to burst forth.

That assertion is made by Helen Buckler, who has just completed a survey of prisons for Good Housekeeping Magazine.

"There are just two things to be done about this appalling situation," she declares. "Either we can go on as we have been, taking the stupidly easy and reckless course of stuffing men like cattle into crowded cell blocks, locking them up out of the way for increasingly longer periods of time, then letting them out in a worse physical, mental and moral state to be greater social problems than they went in. Or we can follow the course the women of the country have pointed out."

"It is significant that not one of the terrifying prison outbreaks of past months has occurred in a woman's prison. Yet women prisoners can be just as desperate and just as recklessly violent in their desperation as men prisoners. It is not a dozen years ago that state troopers were called to quell a riot in an eastern institution for women. Nor is this an isolated occurrence; it has repeated itself in various parts of the country."

Women administrators of prisons for women have led the way in scientific rehabilitation, the investigator declares. They have learned the importance of providing work for inmates, of treating each prisoner as an individual problem, and of making living conditions as cheerful as possible.

"At prisons for women there are no grim walls, calculated to inspire fear and despair," Miss Buckler says in her Good Housekeeping report. "Frequently not even a wire fence. Spacious green grounds are graced by trees and bright flowers, with every chance given the natural wonders of sky and hill and growing things to lift and feed the soul. The buildings are pleasant and simple, of the aspect of a large country house or school hall, with inviting porches and frequently with unbarred windows open to the sun and air. Not a guard or a sentry in sight. Nowhere any appearance of restraint or regimentation. Even the words 'convict' and 'prisoner' have dropped completely from the vocabulary of these institutions."

If that sounds too soft for the criminal, the proof to the contrary is found in the records of accomplishment in the institutions for women, the investigator declares.

After Forty Years Plant Has Blooms

North Great River.—After 40 years of careful attention in the home here of Mrs. M. E. Norman, seventy-two years old, a night-blooming cereus rewarded its owner for her lifetime of care by producing a bloom which remained in its prime for nearly three hours.

Dairy Cows Rustling in Stalk Fields for Feed

Dairy cows forced to rustle around a cornstalk field for a part of their feed in winter cannot produce enough milk to make them profitable. Even when the very best of grain feeds are fed to cows which are called upon to get all their dry roughage in the stalk field, there is very little chance for them to make a worthwhile milk yield. One reason for this is that cows that are kept out of doors use up most of their feed to keep warm, and the other reason is that there is very little in cornstalks from which a cow can make milk.

A good milk-producing cow is usually thin in flesh. She is thin-skinned and cannot stand the cold. She needs to be kept in warm quarters to be comfortable. Even under such conditions she cannot make much use of cornstalks as a part of her feed. She needs plenty of digestible, milk making feeds all the time. This is true whether she is in milk or in dry condition. When she is not making milk she should be fed liberally so that she will keep on producing milk profitably when she freshens again.

Ground Soy Beans

Dairy soy beans are a very satisfactory source of protein on many dairy farms. Usually only favorable comment is heard from men feeding beans during the cold weather. In summer, however, a lack of palatability in the ration containing the ground beans is often reported. In most cases, however, the beans are not refused by the herd when first ground but rather after the feed has been ground two weeks or more. The finer the beans are ground the more trouble.

Measuring Efficiency of Cow Is the Latest Task

Electricity's latest task is a boon to the dairy industry. In the laboratories of the College of Agriculture, University of California, at Davis, Calif., there has just been completed a "respiration chamber" in which the input-output efficiency of a cow may be tested electrically. In fact, provisions are made for tests on two cows at one time.

The animals are provided with comfortable stalls in air-tight chambers, and are fed, watered, milked and cleaned under careful laboratory conditions. The feed is weighed, the water is analyzed and the air in the chambers is cooled and humidified. Attendants who enter the chamber at regular intervals must pass through an air lock auxiliary chamber to prevent air leakage.

The breathing of the animals is measured by an elaborate "mechanical lung" device called an "aspirator," designed and built by Doctor Kleiber on the staff of the college. A classifier, in the basement under the respiration chamber, separates the waste products. The entire equipment is about three times the size of a large motor bus, and it cost nearly three times as much.
