Twenty-first Idaho Legislature Closes

The regular session of the twenty-first Idaho legislature ended without completing the work that appeared necessary and will therefore hold a special session to finish its labors.

The bills expected in the special session will no doubt cover the general sales tax, the kilowatt tax, the income tax and mine tax.

The kilowatt tax is reported as being a favorite in the eyes of the legislators for sure passage and a favorable vote on the income tax is to be expected.

A few of the recent efforts of the legislature are indicated by the bills listed below.

Bills Signed By The Governor:

H. B. 125, by banking committee—Relating to depositing money of counties in banks and trust companies.

H. B. 143, by charitable and penal institutions committee—Prohibiting the enticing away, harboring or employing or adding in the escape of any inmate of any institution owned by the state.

H. B. 144, by highways committee—Creating motor vehicle refund fund.

H. B. 149, by appropriations committee—Making appropriations for state land department, etc.

H. B. 151, by judiciary committee—Including requests and legates in statutes.

H. B. 152, by forestry committee—Relating to hearings by state cooperative board of forestry.

H. B. 172, by library committee—Designating syringa state flower.

H. B. 180, by appropriations committee—Appropriating \$1200 for Eva Stenningberg.

H. B. 181, by appropriations committee—Appropriating sum of \$5000 for state land water maintenance fund.

Introduced in The House:
H. B. 326, by committee on municipalities—Amending section of the statutes relating to abstract of patents.

H. B. 327, by appropriations committee—Making an appropriation of \$2252.80 for the payment of a claim against the state of Idaho.

H. B. 328, by appropriations committee—Appropriating \$4400 for repairs of the roof of the capitol building.

H. B. 329, by livestock committee—Providing for issuance of certificates by brand inspectors, and providing for inspections of marks and brands of cattle, transported from one county to another.

H. B. 330, by waterways and drainage committee—Amending section of the statutes relating to the issuance of tax deeds to counties.

H. B. 331, by revenue and taxation committee—Amending section of the statutes relating to the classification of lands for the purpose of assessment and taxation.

H. B. 347, by livestock committee—Relating to taking up of stray stock.

H. B. 335, by state library committee—An act relating to revenue and taxation, imposing a license tax on every person, as defined in section 3108 of compiled statutes, engaged in this state in the business of selling or distributing goods, wares or merchandise at retail.

H. B. 336, by industries committee—Authorizing, empowering and directing state board of land commissioners to code, grant, relinquish certain lands at Lava Hot Springs.

H. J. M. 4, by industry committee—Urging congress control waters of upper Snake river to prevent floods.

H. B. 332, by ways and means committee—Empowering the commissioners of counties to levy a special tax for the purpose of paying not to exceed one-third of the cost of construction of service men's memorials.

H. B. 333, by highways committee—Providing for percentage of moneys collected for motor vehicle license be placed in motor vehicle fund.

S. B. 118, by state affairs committee—Relating to fees to be paid by land and building corporations for doing business in the state, by requiring capital of at least \$50,000.

S. B. 119, by state affairs committee—Code for foreign building and loan associations doing business in Idaho.

S. B. 121, by agriculture committee—Providing that it shall be unlawful for any manufacturer to sell tractors, engines or harvesters in the state without establishing a depot for spare parts.

S. B. 120, by state affairs committee—Requiring proper casing and plugging of gas and oil wells and prohibiting wasteful use and burning of natural gas.

S. B. 124, by fish and game committee—Changing the fishing dates on north fork of Snake river.

S. B. 125, by state affairs committee—Relating to the powers of land and building corporations to borrow money, providing amount borrowed shall not exceed twenty per cent of assets.

S. B. 129, by highways, bridges and ferries committee—Providing that no good roads district shall include within its boundaries any village having a population of more than 2500.

Briefly Told for Busy Readers

**CLAIM HORSE MEAT SALE
BOWLING TILT LOOMS
CATTLE FEVER CURED
POTATOES GO TO COAST
ROAD WORK LARGE ITEM**

POCATELLO, IDA.—A local citizen has been arrested, charged with selling horse meat to restaurants and also, possession of rum.

IDAHO FALLS, IDA.—Cities of southern Idaho and of Utah will soon compete in a tournament for bowling honors. Salt Lake, Ogden, Idaho Falls, Boise, Twin Falls, Salmon, St. Anthony, and Pocatello have arranged to enter teams in the meet.

PANGUITCH, UT.—A total of 1350 cattle in this district have been vaccinated against undulant fever, and seven fever cases treated, all recovering, by the extension service and county agent.

PROVO, UT.—Many potato growers of Utah county have found a market in California for their crop of russet potatoes.

OGDEN, UT.—The forest highways approved from the regular forest highway appropriation, and from the unemployment forest highway funds for this year, are: Wyoming-Hoback canyon, \$177,800; Teton Pass, \$25,000; Wind River, \$24,800; Logan-Garden City, \$101,000; Alpine Scenic highway, \$3,000; Heber-Fruitland, \$12,000; Sevier-Cove Fort, \$106,107; Bryce Canyon, \$63,000; Blanding natural bridges, \$10,000.

JUNCTION, UT.—Rodent control work conducted in this section in twelve towns has resulted in 2420 pounds of poisoned oats and wheat being distributed in sparrow and other pest campaigns recently.

VERNAL, UT.—A total of 453 individual permits have been approved for the grazing of 6800 head of cattle and 15,800 sheep on the Nebo division of the Utah national forest for the ensuing year.

POCATELLO, IDA.—The roads of southern Idaho have been kept open and maintained in better condition than from any previous seasons, because of a light fall of snow this winter.

SALT LAKE CITY, UT.—Appropriation of \$86,832 to Utah high schools has been announced by the state superintendent of public instruction. The amount represents 70 per cent of the \$124,051.79 raised by the two-tenths of a mill tax levied exclusively for high school purposes. The distribution this year is \$14,123.36 larger than for last year, when the initial 70 per cent appropriation was made. The per capita allotment this year was \$2.88 compared with \$2.71 last year.

RUPERT, IDA.—Farm products totalling 218 carloads were shipped from this city in February, 29 more cars of the same class than were forwarded in the same month of 1930. A list of 186 cars of potatoes were forwarded and this is 28 cars in excess of the shipments of one year ago.

MT. PLEASANT, UT.—Sanpete county will have to borrow money this year to complete highway projects now under construction, according to plans of the county commissioners. A total of \$58,300 will be needed as the county's share to complete the road work this summer.

BLACKFOOT, IDA.—Mrs. Effie Bible's application to make the Gold Star Mothers pilgrimage in 1931 has been approved by the quartermaster general's office. Mrs. Bible makes the fourth Gold Star Mother slated to make the pilgrimage from Bingham county this season.

OGDEN, UT.—Records at the city health department reveal. Ogden has been unusually free from contagious diseases this winter. No cases of measles have been reported and only one case each of scarlet fever and mumps.

CARSON CITY, NEV.—The judiciary committee of the state assembly has reported favorably on a bill that would permit granting of divorce to any person who has resided in the state for six weeks.

MAINT, UT.—Retrenchment on expenses of Sanpete county in a number of departments and public works is proposed by representatives of the farm bureau of the county.

OREM, UT.—Berry acreage in the Orem berry district will be greater in 1931 than 1930 by over 200 acres growers in the district report.

MT. HOME, IDA.—A move is being urged to enlist state aid to begin work on the proposed highway cut-off from Idaho to San Francisco.

TWIN FALLS, IDA.—Efforts to pool the bean crop of growers in the district are being made with much prospects for success.

ST. GEORGE, UT.—Under the direction of District Agricultural Inspector Blazard and the county agent two spray rings have been organized one each at Toquerville and Hurricane and the fruitgrowers have purchased power spray outfits.

SALMON, IDA.—A fire, which was accelerated by a high wind, destroyed \$225,000 worth of buildings in this city. Heroic efforts were required to save many other buildings from the flames.
