—Briefly Told by Busy Readers

FAIR IS PLANNED SUGAR BEET CONTRACT PEA ACREAGE FALLS RECORDS FOR FARMERS SCHOOL CONTEST IS ON

LOGAN, UT.—Cache county's fair will be held from Sept. 15 to 17, the committee announces.

GARLAND, UT.—The opening of the new \$40,000 amusement hall at Garland ward was celebrated by a ward reunion attended by people from all parts of the Bear River valley.

PRESTON, IDA.—Between 500 and 600 acres of sugar beets have been contracted for already under the new prices set. During the week meetings were held in the various districts to contract and explain new methods by which beetgrowers can grow a larger tonnage per acre.

SPRINGVILLE, UT.—A decrease of 40 per cent in pea acreage in this vicinity is predicted for this year, due to quantities of last year's peas yet remaining in storage.

PROVO, UT.—Forty farmers of Utah county have been chosen to keep accurate records of their year's transactions for the purpose of determining definitely their profit for the period, and are receiving instructions from a statistician expert from the extension department of the Utah State Agricultural college.

MONTPELIER, IDA.—A disastrous fire occurred at the ranch of Heber Crane in Nounman recently, in which 100 purebred sheep were burned and a large barn and other buildings were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$10,000.

LOGAN, UT.—Plan of the county school board to close Stephenson school and transport the eighty pupils two miles to the Lewiston central school is opposed by 44 of the 55 parents, according to the delegation which protested the move before the county board of education.

BRIGHAM CITY, UT.—The first sewer system of the city is to be constructed in the near future. The work will cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

TOOELE, UT.—Tooele post office has been officially sanctioned and bids on the site for such a building have been called for.

EMMETT, IDA.—Both the Barber and Emmett sawmills of the Boise-Payette lumber company are now in full operation. The plants have been operated only part time during the winter and have been repaired and overhauled during the time they were not running.

BOISE, IDA.—Twenty-eight of the Boise teachers who get the maximum salary will not get their \$90 increase next year which was given them last year, according to the decision reached by the board of education.

PRESTON, IDA.—Franklin county will hold a fair this fall if a long time contract can be drawn up with the city for the use of the Preston city ball park.

LEHI, UT.—The Alpine board of education has ordered the advertising for bids on raising of the last remaining structure in the way of the development of the \$12,500 Lehi athletic building program.

OGDEN, UT.—To assure the completion of the municipal golf course and the installation of three standard tennis courts in Liberty park this year, the city commission has directed a bonding firm to sell the remaining \$20,000 of recreational bonds.

SALMON, IDA.—A boys' game of Indian fighting resulted in the losing of the sight of one eye, by Carol Bustin, aged twelve years.

LEWISTON, IDA.—Sec. L. W. W. Caldwell, native of Lewiston, who lost his life in a plane crash in Wyoming last October, has been given a posthumous award of the distinguished flying cross by the war department.

MT. PLEASANT, UT.—The No. Sanpete board of education has purchased bonds totaling \$20,050, which will effect a saving of \$1,000 in interest each year. During the past five years the district's bonded indebtedness has been reduced \$43,000, and present plans are to redeem at least \$10,000 annually.

NEPHI, UT.—A backfiring auto broke the arm of A. J. Gowers, superintendent of the city waterworks, but by manipulating the crank with his foot he started the car and drove to a doctor's office for aid.

IDAHO FALLS, IDA.—The National park in Yellowstone will be officially opened this year on June 20th. Automobiles will be admitted to the park until the fifteenth of October, although the season is to end officially on September 19.

OGDEN, UT.—An annual appropriation of \$14,500 for the study of erosion and stream flow in the Intermountain country will be available July 31, 1931, it is announced.

MURRAY, UT.—The city held a celebration to honor the High School basketball team for winning the state championship.

ST. GEORGE, UT.—Frost has taken toll of apricots in this section, while other crops are believed to have escaped. Almond blossoms were also nipped extensively and other crops have been retarded.

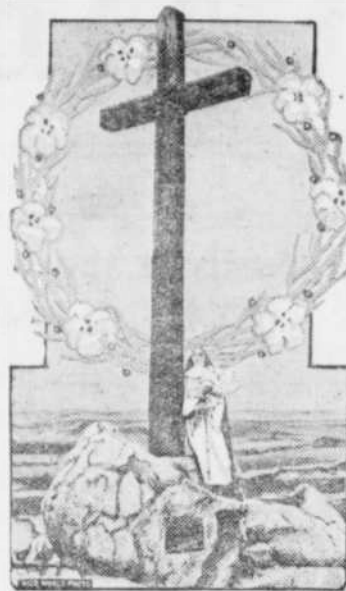

Ancient Symbols of Resurrection

The first temple to Ceres, the Roman goddess of grain, was built in 496 B. C. to commemorate the deliverance from a great famine. At the ancient festival of Ceres it was a practice to fasten burning brands to foxes' tails. The foxes—or corn spirits, as they were called—were turned loose and left to burn, so that their ashes might charm the grain and produce an abundant crop. During this festival grain was scattered about the earth and thrown upon people, because it represented fertility—the germ of life. Our modern custom of throwing rice on newly married couples can be traced to this old pagan festivity.

Long before Christ the Romans burned a new-born calf and scattered the ashes over the soil to induce the earth to yield much grain. This custom was later introduced into China, and as late as 1894 porcelain images of cows were presented to farmers in the spring to bring a good rice crop.

In north Germany, Scotland and England the shepherds used to worship Pales, the shepherd's god, in the springtime. The sheep were first purified by brushing and washing, then sulphur was burned about them. At night the shepherds lighted great bonfires and danced among their sheep by the light of the moon and the fires. In the morning the shepherd looked to the east, toward the resurrected sun, and washed his hands in dew. In some sections of Europe the shepherds still dance at Easter time among their sheep, which now typifies the slain Lamb of God.

The lamb is one of the earliest symbols of the resurrection. Among the Christians of the East a young lamb is always eaten on Easter Sunday. During Passion week hundreds of spring lambs are brought into the market places and sold for the Easter feast. This is a great time for the children of the household, who make friends with the lamb as soon as it is brought home. They tie ribbons around its neck, legs and tail and hang garlands of flowers about its body. Often the father finds it difficult to separate the lamb from the child. But a lamb must be slaughtered for the Easter feast, so two lambs are usually bought—one for the children and one for the festival. The spared lamb becomes the children's inseparable playmate. At bedtime they argue with each other to decide who shall sleep with the lamb. Perhaps this old custom inspired the famous nursery rhyme, "Mary had a little lamb and everywhere that Mary went the lamb was sure to go."—Washington Star.
