UNCLE SAM FINDS HELP

The government has four partners in development of the Vale and Owyhee irrigation projects in Malheur county—Nyssa, Ontario, Vale and Harper.

Setting a precedent in the history of reclamation, business men of these four towns shouldered the task of colonization, organized the Vale-Owyhee Land Settlement association and a task that to many seemed impossible, is now being carried on with astonishing success.

March 15, 1929 public spirited men of these four towns organized with J. D. Fairman, now county commissioner, of Harper, president; C. H. Oxman, vice president; Estes L. Morton, secretary; J. J. Sarazin, R. J. Davis, S. D. Goshert and J. P. Dunaway, Nyssa; C. M. Robinette and E. P. Hendrix, Vale; and H. C. Boyer of Ontario, directors. The board consists of the three directors of the two irrigation districts and a member from each of the four commercial clubs of the towns participating in the settlement program. Honorary members are Frank T. Morgan and H. G. Kennard, district secretaries, and County Agent R. G. Larson.

Each community has contributed \$200 annually and the county appropriates a larger share. An enterprising sales agent, F. B. Zutes, of Vale was employed and he has sold more than 5479 acres of land to settlers for \$53,788.07. The Harper and west Bully creek divisions of the Vale project have been colonized. Effort is now directed on the east Bully creek unit. The settlement drive is wonderfully successful.

We are doing a neighborly work. We are helping each other. It is good business because the Vale lands will be ready for settlement when the Vale project is completed and colonized.

We should give credit to our local citizens who have carried on, to the state chamber of commerce and Union Pacific railroad, who have assisted.

MEIER IN FULL POWER

Rufus C. Holman, Portland, active supporter of Governor Meier, is state treasurer of Oregon.

He succeeds Thomas B. Kay, removed from office swiftly and at his usual tasks by death. Kay's service to his state made him known even in the most distant corners of Oregon. He served in the legislature and was elected four times to the office of state treasurer. It is said of him that he refused to permit political expediency to influence his honest convictions.

To Mr. Holman goes the responsibility of carrying on. Undoubtedly he will stand in line with the policies of Governor Meier, who is now in complete dominance in governmental and administrative affairs.

There is question as to what the outcome will be. We, too, are interested.
