COUNTY LAMB MEET JULY 17

EARLE RACEY OF NATIONAL WOOL GROWERS AND MRS. W. T. MAHONEY, OF STATE AUXILIARY, WILL DIRECT PROGRAM.

Sheepmen and their wives and business men who are affected indirectly by the sheep industry are expected to journey from all parts of Malheur county for the first of a series of "Eat-More-Lamb" meetings in Ontario tomorrow (Friday). The session will convene at the Moore hotel at 1:30 p. m.

"If better prices are to be received for feeder lambs, consumption of lamb meat must increase and if consumption of lamb is increased, it is up to sheepmen to put across the program," states Earle Racey, of the National Wool Growers association.

"When we realize the fact that 84 per cent of the population of the United States is not familiar with the quality of lamb meat and also that only 42 per cent of the meat consumed is lamb, we can plainly see there is great possibilities in the project," Racey declared.

Mrs. W. T. Mahoney, president of the state auxiliary of the Oregon Wool Growers, will meet with women who attend.

County Agent R. G. Larson is cooperating and urges all sheepmen and others concerned in the industry to be present.
