WATER, POWER FACTIONS WIN

IDAHO POWER COMPANY WILL SUPPLY EXTRA WATER; ONTARIO-NYSSA DISTRICT ASSURED POWER DELIVERY.

The Ontario-Nyssa and Gem Irrigation districts will receive no cut in their power supply from the Black Canyon dam and the Emmett farmers, who demanded more water than the contract provided regardless of power delivery by the government, will receive additional water.

Idaho Power company stepped into the breach and agreed to furnish Emmett farmers 10,000 acre feet of water from its holdings in the Deadwood reservoir. The water, normally held by the company till September, will be released August 10. The company will make up the resultant shortage of water for power in September by deliveries from other points on Snake river.

The agreement, satisfactory to all parties, was effected by Engineer Banks, Governor C. Ben Ross, Senator Borah and M. L. Hibbard, general manager of the Idaho Power company.

Governor Ross praised the attitude of the power company and of the reclamation service, declaring that both were eager to prevent damage to the irrigation projects.

The governor pointed out it was the second time the power company had come to the assistance of the various projects under the Deadwood reservoir this season, the first one being in June when the company began an emergency delivery of 8000 horsepower for irrigation pumping projects.

A ROAD OF UTILITY

The fact that there is already considerable travel over the I-O-N highway despite its atrocious condition seems to provide the final clinching argument to prove that an improved highway is necessary. It should be said, too, that much of the present travel over the road is truck tonnage, upholding the claim that the I-O-N is essentially a highway of agricultural utility.

Our Neighbors In Nyssa and Nearby

WARREN ESTABLISHED MILL

Business flourished when the Nyssa Flour mill began business here in 1917. It was war time. There was a keen demand for wheat. Farmer and miller made money.

P. M. (Phineas Marvin) Warren had no idea of being a miller but he invested too much money in a stock proposition and to save it had to become miller. First, he purchased a lone share; then it was three and finally thirteen.

A Midget Marvel mill was ordered and when it arrived at the Nyssa station no one was on deck to receive it. More money was required. "It was simply a case of sink or swim," said Warren. "I secured the necessary loan, unloaded the mill and first I knew I was grinding excellent home grown wheat into white, feathery flour."

"I believed in advertising. I had all the good cooks in town bake pies and cakes of Nyssa White Swan Flour. We displayed them at the Malheur county fair and the demand for Nyssa flour doubled."

The Nyssa mill is a structure 30 by 50 feet in size. With basement, it has three floors. The mill's capacity is 30 sacks per shift. Since the price of wheat went down, Warren cut down on milling although he has continued feed grinding and also turns out orders for flour.

Warren served Nyssa as mayor six of the 39 years he has lived in this community. He and his council purchased the site of the city park and ball diamond. Both water systems were built during his years in office. "I wanted a low pressure system for irrigation," said Warren, "and if we had it, everyone in town would have a fine little garden like mine. That garden produces the best squash, tomatoes and cucumbers in the country."

April is Warren's lucky month. He was born and married in April. He first saw the dawn in Iowa April 16, 1863. Twenty-eight years later he married Miss Ida Haley in Houston, Ida., April 29, 1891.

When a boy of six, he crossed the plains with his father by ox team. "We didn't see any Indian warfare but we experienced scares aplenty," said Warren. "Even the oxen were on the watch. At a moment's notice, they would form in a circle." Warren has never forgotten how a member of the

train was horsewhipped for disobeying the captain and sent back to the east. The Warrens have a family of old-fashioned size, eight children and 13 grand-children.
