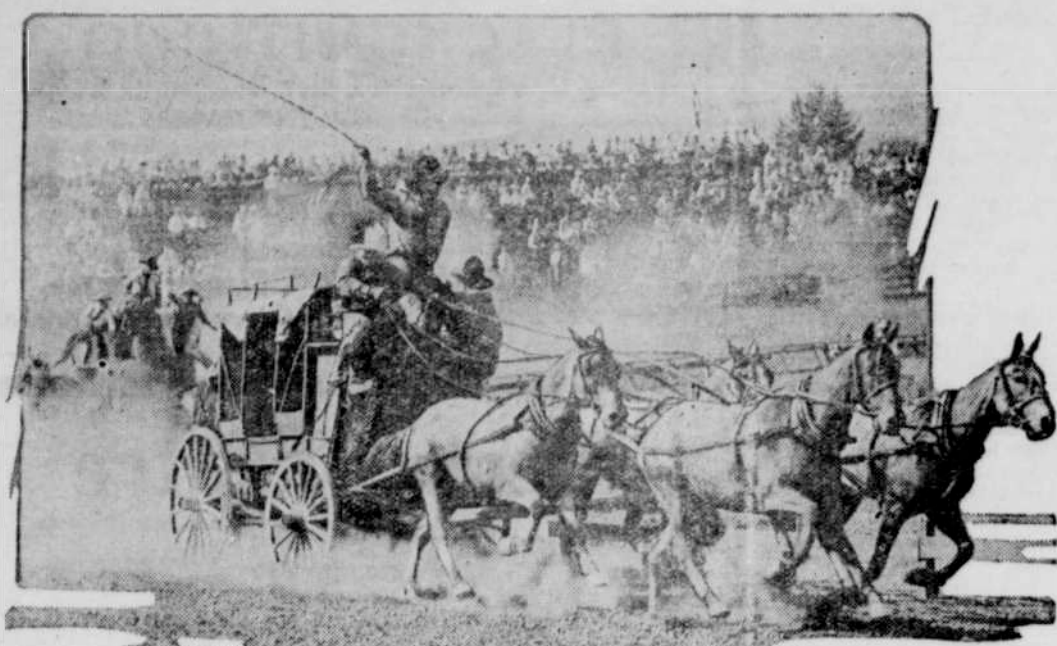


OVERLAND STAGE IS SYMBOL OF OLD WEST AT PENDLETON ROUND-UP

I. O. N. BACKERS TAKE PLEA TO GOVERNOR MEIER

Rockville—(To the Editor)—Are we outlaws or citizens of Oregon, we people who request the designation of the I. O. N. from Nyssa to Jordan Valley and McDermitt?

For years and years, we have endeavored to secure a road to the outside world and now that we have a chance to get an appropriation from the government, we receive little or no support. We pay taxes. They are collected without fail. Office seekers remember us when they need our vote, but the rest of the time we are ignored or perhaps looked upon as "outlaws."

In fairness to our county officers, we will say that the road is fair to Jordan Valley. From Jordan to McDermitt it can scarcely be called a road.

August 8, we sent in four petitions to

Governor Meier and the state highway commission carrying the names of 167 taxpayers of Rome, Danner, Arock, Rockville, Jordan Valley and Adrian, asking the building of the I. O. N. We understand a petition was also mailed from Nyssa to Governor Meier and the commission.

We have never fought the Yellowstone Cut-off. We are glad to see it nearing completion, but had the I. O. N. also received the endorsement of the county, it might now be assured an allotment of federal money.

We wish to add that we appreciate The Journal's fairness. We trust that The Journal is right about Wm. Hanley's appointment to the state highway commission; that he will be able to see on "two sides of the fence."

*When the National Better Business Bureau realized that their Bulletin No. 634 was being taken advantage of by some advertisers they issued a Bulletin dated July 10th as follows:

"In our Bulletin No. 634 entitled 'Definitions of Terms Used in the Tire Industry' we published definitions of First Line—Second Line—Third Line—Heavy Duty and Super Heavy Duty Tires.

"Our definitions pointed out, 'Although each manufacturer's or distributor's first line tire may represent his best standard size 4 or 6 ply tire, there is not necessarily any equality of competitive first line tires as to materials, workmanship or price.' This interpretation also applies to all lines of tires.

"We therefore recommend that advertising to the consumer shall avoid the use of these terms for the purpose of comparing competitive products."
