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THE PASSING OF EDISON

Thomas Alva Edison quietly passed away at 24 minutes after 3 a. m. October 18, 1931. (Signed) Dr. Hubert S. Howe.

The foregoing message told the world of the death of one of the most useful men of all time. Columns have been written of his inventions, and of his life, but no words, no praise, no monument, can equal the accomplishments of his great life that will forever bless all mankind. In every land, in every corner of the world, are scientific de-

vises that are the results of his genius. Thomas Edison was born in Milan, Ohio, February 11, 1847, of Dutch ancestry on his father's side and Scottish on his mother's. His schooling consisted of three months in the public school at Huron, Michigan, except the great education that was self acquired. At 12 he was a railroad newsboy and after 14 earned a living as telegraph operator. During every spare moment he studied and experimented. We read that in 1888 Edison took out his first patent, an electrical vote recorder. He devised stock tickers and

automatic telegraph systems. Then he aided in bringing the Bell telephone into use. In 1877 Edison made application for a patent on a "talking machine." In 1879 he introduced the first incandescent electric lamp and then followed the great development in electric heat, light and power. From 1891 to 1900 he perfected electrically operated railways. In 1891 he applied for a patent for taking motion pictures. He was the father of movies and talkies.

Edison is not dead. He will ever be with us—a living part of the world that his genius and energy wonderfully modernized.

FRANCES E. WILLARD DAY

Frances E. Willard Day will be observed in the schools of Nyssa tomorrow, the fourth Friday in October, as is provided by legislative enactment in Oregon.

Frances Elizabeth Willard was born September 28, 1839, in Churchville, New York. Her childhood and girlhood spent at Forest Home, near Janesville, Wis., were singularly beautiful. "In those years," says one who knew her well, "when through home and God's fatherhood over all, there was implanted and nourished in her the 'sweet skill' of loving much, of trust and truth, obedience and endeavor."

She attended Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., from which she graduated and later became dean of women.

As president of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, 19 years, and of the World W. C. T. U. 15 years, Frances E. Willard did her greatest work for society.

"She was a great leader because within her hand she held the hearts of all who followed, and with irresistible charm drew those who lacked the courage to follow. All loved her because she loved all. She recognized the best in each, and each reached out and up and made endeavor because its best was recognized. All trusted her because she trusted all. Manhood is nobler, womanhood truer, children safer because Frances E. Willard lived."

Posterity remembers her for her genius in promoting her temperance movement through the W. C. T. U. This unique organization tested by the simplicity of its methods, by the purity of its motives, by the intensity of its zeal, by the scope of its activities, by its power of endurance and rejuvenation, is without parallel in history.

In Statuary Hall, Washington D. C., the statue of Frances E. Willard stands next to that of Abraham Lincoln. Miss Willard is the only woman thus far to be so honored.
