SNAKE RIVER LEADS IN SUPPLYING WATER TO OREGON PROJECTS

Irrigated farms in Oregon increased from 9,154 in 1920 to 11,387 in 1930. Value of land and improvements is estimated at \$171,919,001, according to the Bureau of Census.

Snake river and its tributaries furnished water for nearly a third of the total irrigated area; Klamath river one-seventh. Three-fourths of the irrigated area is served by gravity diversion. However, the number of irrigation pumping plants doubled in the decade totaling 1,091 in 1930.
