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BORAH PROPOSES SALARY SLASH

Comments regarding Senator's Borah's salary reduction bill indicate that most citizens who are keeping an eye on politics think it one of the good bills introduced at this session of congress. Merchants and farmers have expressed themselves in accord.

Borah says that reasonable reduction of government salaries would save taxpayers from 200 million to 225 million dollars. His bill provides for cutting salaries between \$5000 and \$7500 by 6 per cent; salaries from \$7000 to \$10,000, ten per cent, and higher salaries 20 per cent.

The cut would apply to all government employees except persons holding judicial positions and the President of the United States. The constitution prevents their salaries from being reduced.

"Investigation discloses," Borah said, "that total salaries drawn by employees of state and federal governments in 1931 was about six billion dollars, and this amounts to about 40 per cent of the gross expenditures of these governments."

"I am urging these salary cuts simply because we are in the midst of a national crisis and every one must share its burdens."

Under Borah's bill the salaries of members of congress would be cut from \$10,000 a year to \$8000.

"The Association continues to grow itself without much effort behind it," advises Peterson. The First Mortgage is a mutual association, paid members 8 per cent during 1926 and 7, and 10 per cent continuously on members accounts beginning 1928.—Oregon Voter.

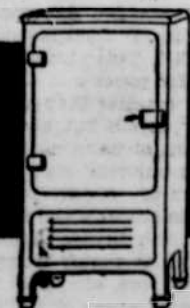
