GAME WARDEN POISONS CROWS AND MAGPIES

Curtis Townsend, Malheur county game warden, has been poisoning crows on Crow Island. He reports that during a 10-day period 500 were killed. Further poisoning will be supplied in the effort to rid this section of the thousands of these birds which raid game birds' nests and fatten on the farmers' fields. He also has 21 stations where bait is spread for magpies. In spite of the long winter and heavy snow, the pheasants and partridges are doing well, Townsend said.

It is not unusual to see dozens of pheasants during a drive of a few miles.

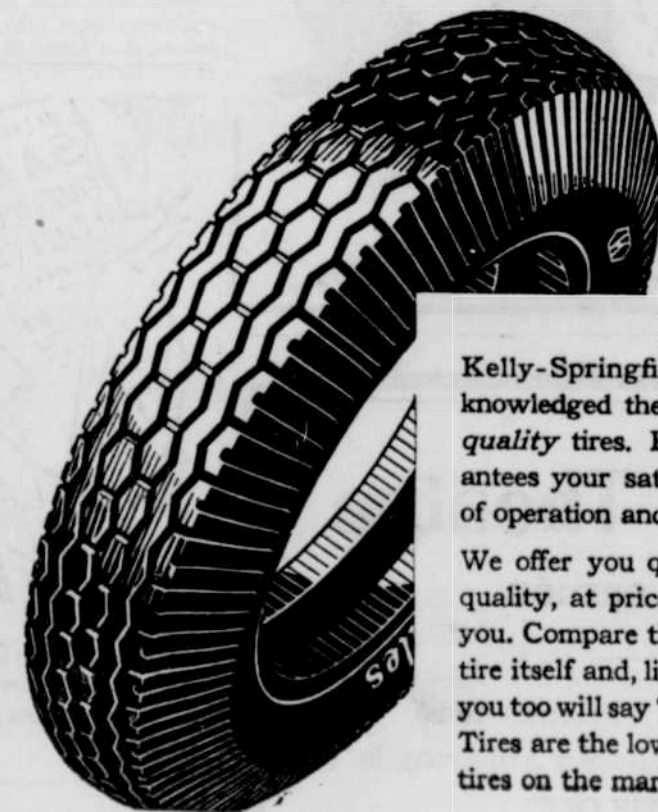
