John Forbes purchased a new General Electric Radio from Baldrige Implement company last week.



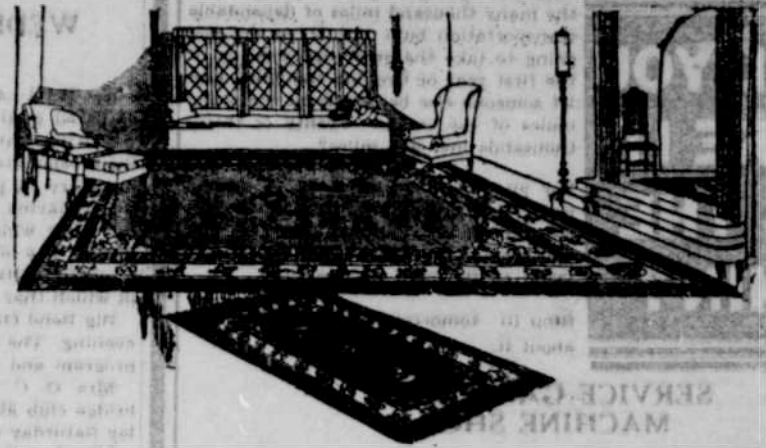
