Oliver Packwood and B. G. Roberts spent Tuesday in Vale, where Mr. Packwood made final proof on his homestead.



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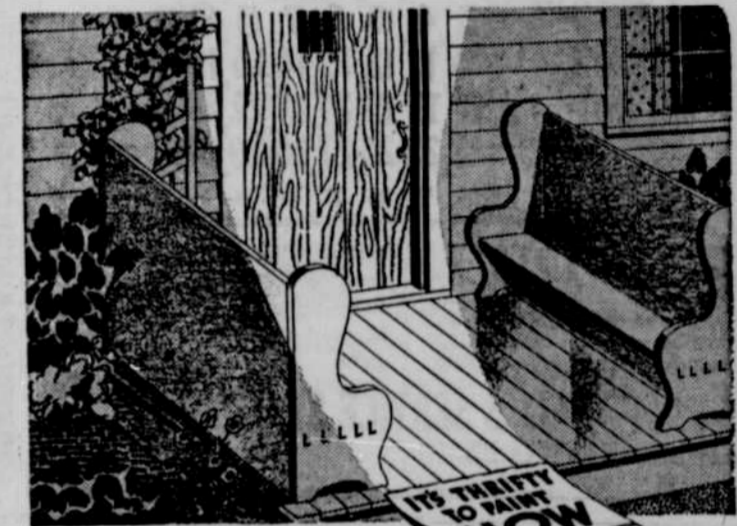


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
