PUBLIC LIKES GAME PLAN

From all corners of the state comes word that the Oregon State Game Commission is meeting with a great deal of encouragement in its plans for propagation of wild life throughout the state.

The recent tours of different sections have met with active interest on the part of the people who realize the benefits to be derived through the work of the commission. The public, not just the sportsmen, is awakening to the value of hunting and fishing. The sport provides healthful and beneficial diversion and also makes an appeal to tourists. Business men everywhere are finding the money left in their communities by tourists means a good deal. Good fishing and hunting is good bait.

The tour made a few weeks ago included a visit in Malheur county, when a request was made by the wild life league for increased development of game resources here. We have rivers, reservoirs, streams at our doors. A little effort will make them a real advantage.

A GOOD WORD FOR ENGLISH SPARROW

The much-maligned English sparrow has at last had its day in court with a friendly judge. Says the magazine, Bird-Lore, official publication of the National Association of Audubon Societies:

"According to Dr. Thomas E. Winecoff, in charge of research for the Pennsylvania game commission, this generally unpopular bird has been found to be one of the few which are destroyers of the obnoxious Japanese beetle. Investigations of field men in the southeastern part of the state have shown that, in addition to the English sparrow, the ring-necked pheasant, the purple grackle, the starling and robin all eat this greatly destructive beetle."

THE TIDE IS TURNING

According to the president of the Federal Land Bank of St. Louis, there is an unmistakable drift from the cities towards the farms and towns. While that may not be of particular interest to citizens they will be interested in the further statement that this unquestionably means eventual solution of the unemployment problem.

The hazards of city life, with its uncertain livelihood, are tending to reverse the old order and today the movement is not from the farm and small town toward the city; it is just the other way. The city once held alluring promises for the rural resident. Now the farm appeals to destitute city people as a place of security. They have come to believe that they can grub a living out of the ground; they have come to know it can't always be dug up on concrete streets and within the walls of skyscraper buildings.

It is also explained by the Farm Land Bank official that improved agricultural methods, modern conveniences, paved highways and more efficient means of communication have combined to lessen drudgery which was once the farmer's lot while bringing him many of the advantages enjoyed by the city dweller. The Land Bank man may be right, it may be the farm and the small town, after all, that will lead the country back to prosperity.
