This will not bring back the Lindbergh baby, the child that brightened a once happy home, but it will serve as a warning to others.

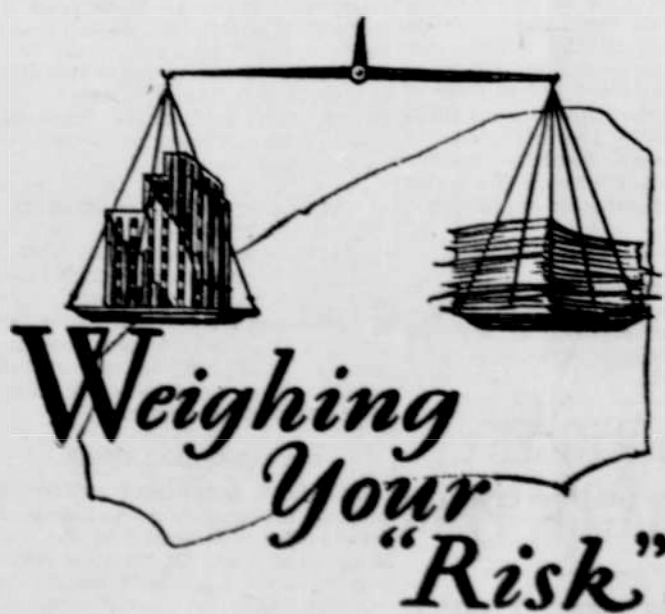

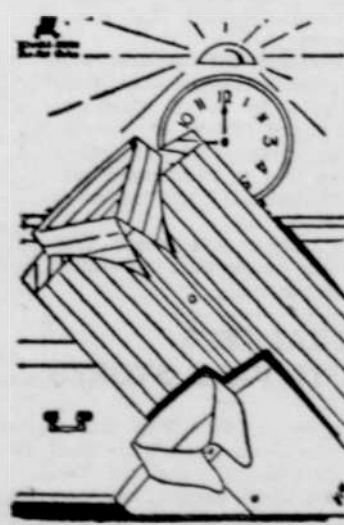
R. C. Enos and E. H. Brumbach of Big Bend attended the road meeting in Jordan Valley Saturday.
