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THREE GOVERNORS ACCEPT BIDS TO ROAD CELEBRATION

Three governors, James Rolph of California, Julius L. Meier of Oregon and C. Ben Ross of Idaho, have accepted the invitation of the Yellowstone Cut-off highway association to take part in the caravan dedication of the new road July 8 and 9. It is expected that Governor Rolph will accompany the caravan from Redding, Cal., on the morning of July 8 and attend festivities in Burns. Governor Meier will join the party at Lakeview. On July 9, the caravan will drive over the Central Oregon highway through Juntura, Harper, Vale and thence to Ontario where Governor Ross of Idaho will attend the festivities.

POISON BRAN WILL KILL MR. CUTWORM

Cutworms, the baby stage of night-flying moths, have a common habit that can be utilized for their destruction, says P. L. Rice, assistant entomologist with the University of Idaho experiment station.

During the cool of the evening and at night they crawl to the surface of the ground to seek food. Cabbage plants and flowers they relish, but they can be misled into eating poisoned bran mash. Try this formula on Mr. Cutworm:

Coarse bran 10 pounds
Paris green or white arsenic, 6 ounces
Cheap molasses 1-2 ounces
Salt 8 ounces
Water, about 1 gallon

Thoroughly mix the dry bran and poison. Stir the salt, water and molasses together, then pour this solution over the dry mixture and mix it thoroughly again. The mash should be just moist enough to break up readily into small particles when thrown from the hand. Avoid leaving it in wet lumps.

Broadcast this poison bait on the ground just before plants are set out or before they come up, and scatter it freely around the edge of garden patches and in flower beds. It should be applied late in the evening so cutworms will feed on it while moist. Give them a second meal if necessary.

POSTAL RATES GO UP JULY 6

An order for the increase of postage on first class letters from 2 cents to 3 cents, provided for by recent congressional action, has been received by Postmaster Dean Smith of the Nyssa office. The higher rate becomes effective July 6. The new rate applies to all first class letters.

One cent postal cards and letters, such as statements and others for delivery from the postoffice at which they are posted can still be sent for 1c.

The rate on mail carried by airplane shall be 8c for the first ounce or fraction thereof and 13c for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

The rate of advertising matter of newspapers increased from 1c to 3c a pound, according to zones. The Eighth zone now requires a 3c increase in postage.

No change will be made on parcel post rates at this time, but it is expected a change will be effected this fall.

Unchanged is the rate on overseas letters which now require 5c on the first ounce or fraction thereof and 3c for each additional ounce or fraction.

AGRICULTURAL HINTS

The feeding value of barley is higher than that of oats, pound for pound. Winter activity of bees to generate heat in the hive makes them age too soon.

Apple trees planted 40 feet apart yielded 43 bushels more fruit to the acre than trees spaced 30 feet apart.

With fertile soil at least 20 bushels of potato seed may be used profitably to the acre, using one and one-half pieces spaced 10 to 11 inches in the row.

Four types of lambs are produced for the market: hothouse, Easter, early summer, and fall lambs. Regardless of the type of market lamb produced, it is essential that the breeding ewes be kept in a thrifty condition during the winter and early spring.
