Butter is the richest food fat source of this vitamin.

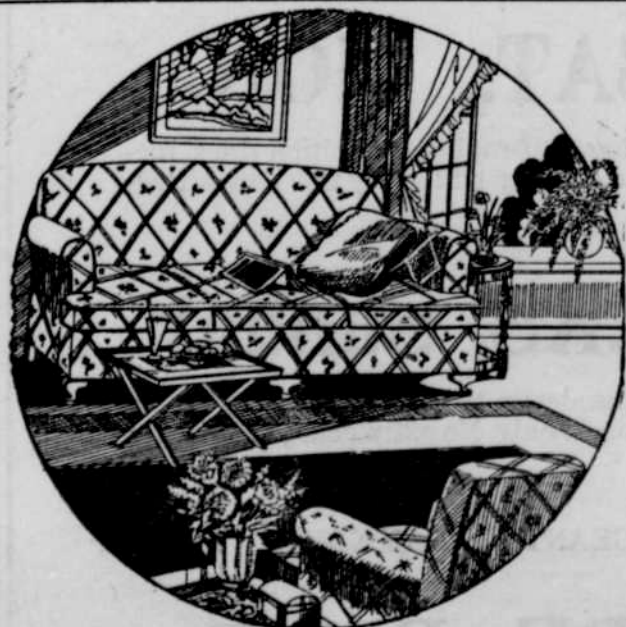
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THINNING FRUIT ASSURES QUALITY

HORTICULTURIST SAYS IT IS BETTER TO THIN AND PRODUCE HIGH QUALITY FRUIT.

Fruit growers who have trees heavily loaded this year may find that they will be in a relatively better position to sell fruit this fall if these heavily loaded trees are thinned, at least enough to lighten the load on the tree, according to O. T. McWhorter extension horticulturist of O.A.C.

In a recent bulletin, McWhorter states that restrictions placed on American fruit by foreign countries is resulting in the Eastern fruit growing section turning their attention to the production of a higher grade of fruit and to look to American markets. This means more competition for Northwest fruit, particularly apples and peaches. Quality of the fruit can be greatly improved by getting rid of "C" grade apples at thinning time.

The grower must pay for harvesting all cull and "C" grade fruit if this surplus is not removed at thinning time, and bear the added cost of sorting the culls in the packing shed. The better plan is to thin and produce a maximum of high quality fruit.

Recent information gives as a general rule, 30 to 40 leaves per single fruit when fruit is thinned on a leaf area basis. Whether thinning is as extensive as this, growers are urged to thin to get rid of cull and "C" grade apples, and keep low class fruit from cluttering the market.
