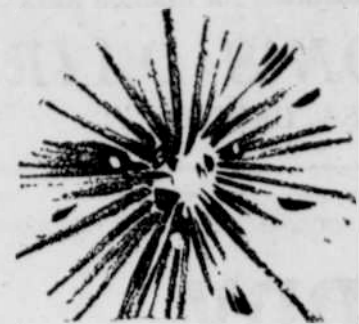
GRAHAM FINDS HORNED TOAD AT MITCHELL BUTTE
