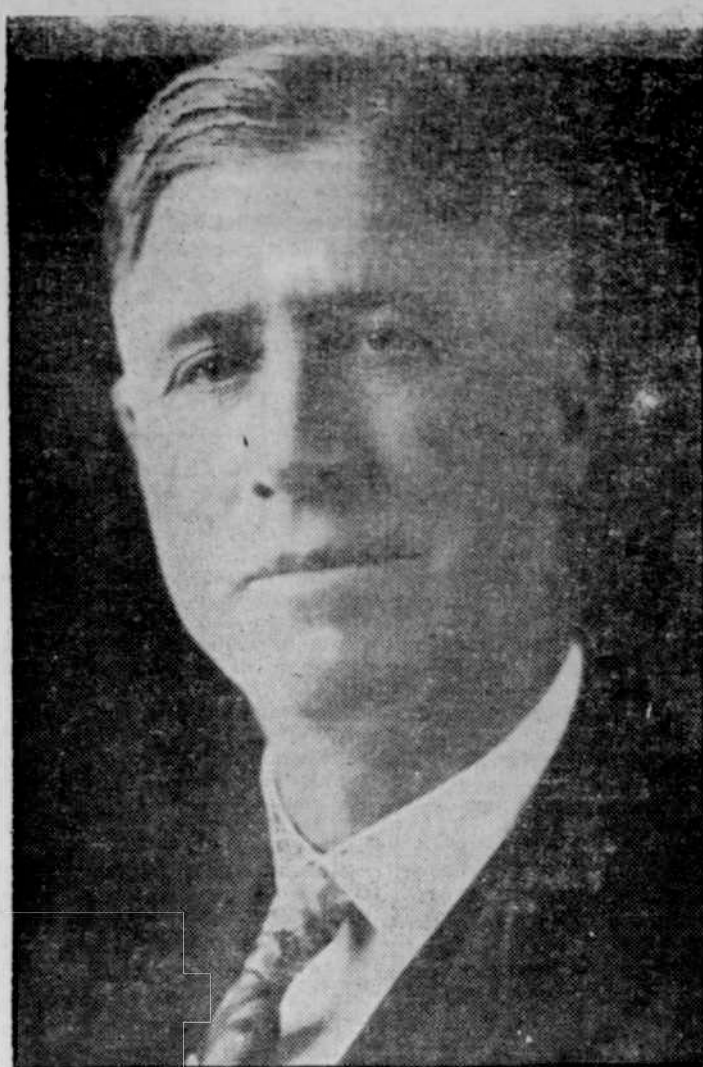

Dorsett, her husband, to the plaintiffs, and recorded in Book 11, of the Record of Mortgages, on page 521 thereof, in the office of the Clerk of the County and State aforesaid; and for the sale of the lands described, situated in Malheur County, State of Oregon, to-wit:

SNAPSHOTS FROM OWYHEE DAM

The Owyhee project organization of Engineer F. A. Banks is much like the spokes of a wheel. Each man plays a part and Engineer Banks is the hub, guiding and working with all of them. Engineer F. B. Schlapkohl has charge of field engineering and construction; C. A. Betts, office engineering and research; Engineer Oscar G. Boden, location surveys; C. S. Hale, inspection of Owyhee dam; Al Johannesen, assistant; Foster Towle and Earl Harmon, tunnel inspection; R. F. Smith and F. C. Bohlson, clerical work.

Santa Claus at Owyhee camp last Christmas and the Christmas before was no other than J. A. MacEachern, president of the General Construction company. The company purchased gifts for over 90 children which were in school the last two terms.

When Engineer Banks came from American Falls Dam to begin work here, he brought men with him who were members of his staff at American Falls. Among them were Engineers Schlapkohl, Hall, Johannesen, F. C. Bohlson and H. N. Bickel. C. A. Betts came from the Denver office of the bureau of reclamation. Mr. Betts was designing engineer on the Moffat tunnel in Colorado.

The dam had a new white way Tuesday night when the lights along the parapet wall were switched on for the first time. Eighteen post lamps have been installed.

One of the first babies born in Owyhee camp was the young son Charles of Bert A. Hall, formerly chief inspector at the dam who is now at Hoover dam.

When Engineer Banks and "Schloppy" F. B. Schlapkohl first went to the damsite and made their camp, it took four hours to drive into town for supplies. Although the road to the dam isn't a highway yet, it requires less than an hour's time to make the trip.

Rejoicing over the completion of the dam is tinged with sadness when it is recalled that four men gave their lives during the years of hazardous work. Gold star workers were W. C. Lindsay and Wm. West, youths who were killed December 1, 1929, when a dump car toppled off a trestle; J. E. Provenchar, who was fatally injured by a falling timber while at work in the fault zone below the dam; and Sam Chestnut, college youth from California, who was instantly killed while at work at the mixing plant October 16, 1930.

Sister, brother and sweetheart—are the flowers at Owyhee camp to Chas. Dooley, caretaker of the government properties at Owyhee Dam. He went to camp with the first engineers and has put plans for beautification into well-cared for lawns and gardens.

Believe it or not, with apologies to Ripley, when the Owyhee Dam was 50 per cent completed, it reached only to the level of the river.
