IRONSIDE MATRON BURIED THURSDAY

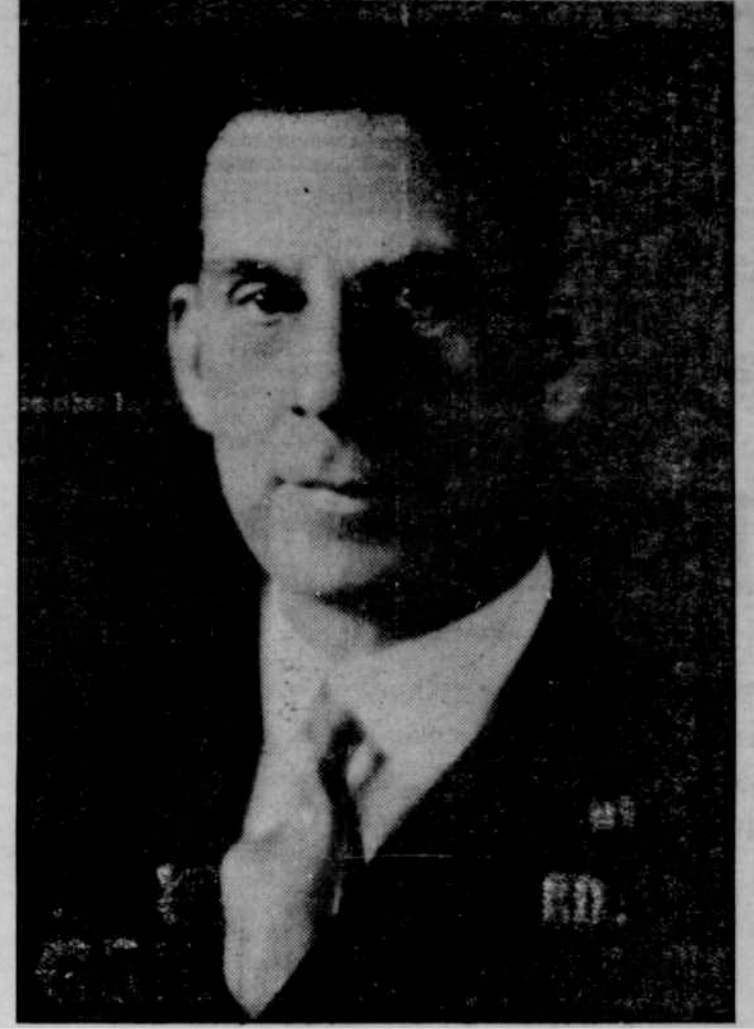
