

Lamb Crop is Short, Hay Steady Says Market Outlook From O. S. C.

Last Season Hard on Lambs

Fewer lambs are being raised in the 13 western range states than for the past two years, according to figures reviewed by the market news office of Oregon State college. The 1932 lamb crop in these states is about 13 percent under 1931, and about 4 per cent below the 1930 crop. This year's crop is still

larger than the 1929 lamb production by about 1,400,000 head.

The poor range and feed situation that existed last fall and winter is blamed for the reduction this year as it resulted in heavy losses of ewes and lambs during the winter and early spring. This summer, however, ranges are holding up better than for several years in the west, and as a result lambs

Growers Hold Hay

The average value of U. S. No. 1 alfalfa at 8 leading domestic markets during July was \$11.50 per ton, compared with \$15.25 in the corresponding month last year, and \$20 for the preceding five years, 1926 to 1930 inclusive. A strong holding tendency on the part of many growers has been noted this season as they are reported unwilling to sell at current bids, hence fair amounts are being stacked. Receipts at the Kansas City market for July totaled only 206 cars compared with a seven-year July average of 642 cars.

Honey Crop Average

The honey crop in the United States this year seems to vary more widely than usual even with individual sections, according to reports gathered by the market news office of the Oregon extension service. In Oregon the main flow is well started east of the Cascades and with hot days and cool nights the prospects are for a good yield.

Orchard Tests in Malheur

To test out the effectiveness of other materials recently developed for cover sprays in controlling moth control, A. B. Cain, local fruit grower, has turned over several blocks of his orchards for some experiments being carried on this season under the supervision of County Agent Larson. One block is being sprayed with standard lead arsenate, 3 pounds per hundred gallons of water, one with Dutox, a floride compound, and oil; and a third with oil and nicotine. There are 12 trees in each block.

Baker Plans Legion Exhibit

Baker county farm products will be represented in the displays to be maintained in all the principal Portland hotels during the coming American Legion national convention. The county agent is working with a committee of the local chamber of commerce in assembling such display materials. An information booth for tourist travel will be maintained in Baker for visitors coming over the Old Oregon Trail. It is expected Malheur county will be represented in crop displays in Portland.

FARM FAMILIES LARGEST

Rural farm families on the average are larger than other classes of related groups in Oregon.

Average size of rural farm family is 3.30 persons, a U. S. census report received at the state house disclosed.

"Medium size of family for the state as a whole was 2.92," said the report. "For the native white families, 2.93; for foreign-born whites, 2.91; and for negro families, 2.03. The median size of urban families was 2.83. Rural non-farm groups average 2.83."
